ed last May and consisting of Chairman Jerry W. McDaniel '40, Ray Warnock '39 and Anthony Kunkoe '39, follows:

"There shall be a judicial committee made up of five members of I F C to be appointed by the president of I F C who will also serve as alternate in case one of the committee's houses is an offender. The committee shall have the power to investigate and to rule on all complaints brought before it. Penalties shall be inflicted when four of the five committee members agree that the penalty be inflicted. Before the penalty be inflicted, the president of the offending house shall have a chance to present his side of the case before the committee.

"(a) The penalty for first offense shall be denial of social privileges for three successive weeks.

"(b) The penalty for second offense shall be denial of social privileges for six successive weeks.

"(c) The penalty for third offense shall be the denial of social privileges for one semester.

"The period of denial in each of the above offenses shall be at the discretion of the committee.

"Penalty for further offenses shall be at the discretion of the committee."

\$53 Surplus Realized
Claiming this to be the first time in history for IFC to realize a surplus during rushing season, William F. Beyer, rushing chairman, reported a balance of \$53, which was turned over to the IFC treasury and later voted to help defray individual house expenses on keys for representatives.

Income came solely from date cards, with \$17 at 50 cents each yielding \$258.50.

Peel Appeals For Fair Play

Damage To Athletic Field Cited As Example Of Poor Citizenship

Pleading for a show of "Fair Play" by the student body, Joseph A. Peel, president of mens' student government, yesterday asked undergraduates to refrain from hazing property around the State College High School Athletic field. Peel's statement follows in full:

"The Board of Directors of the State College Public Schools has asked me to assist them in requesting the students of the Pennsylvania State College to play fair in protecting the public property around the Athletic Field of the State College High School. "It seems to me that College students should be old enough to be law abiding citizens, and in the light of this premise I am appealing to you sense of Fair Play. "The Athletic Field will be patrolled during the games on Friday evenings, and all students who do not desire to attend the games are requested to stay away from the Athletic Field. Let me impress upon you the fact that your individual acts reflect upon your College and in the name of Fair Play let us protect the name of our College by acting as American citizens who believe in law and order and not mob rule!"

Olevy is no longer available for intercollegiate competition, having completed three years of varsity competition.
