Soose Knocks Out Former Champion Risko In 3 Rounds

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 6—Billy Soose, Penn State's hope in the professional middleweight division, needed only three rounds to knock out Eddie "Babe" Risko, the former 160-pound champion, in their scheduled ten-round bout at the Motor Square Garden here last night.
Soose required only one punch to floor the rapidly-fading champion, who held a seven-pound weight advantage over the 155-pound kid.
During a flurry after one minute and 47 seconds of the third round, Soose led with his stinging left jab and crossed with a short right flush to the jaw. His fist traveled no more than seven inches, but from that distance he gathered enough power to blast the Babe on his back and leave him dazed for five minutes.
Running against the clock for the first time, the freshmen cross-country squad showed promise of turning out the well-balanced team that Coach Pete Olexy expects.
With the squad divided into two teams, first place in the workout was taken by Herman Goffberg, who covered the three miles in 16 minutes and 41 seconds.
He was closely followed by Benjamin Kotz, Alex Bourgerie, Arnold Olsen, Earl Buckwalter, and Harold Thiel.
George Harrison was the next man in. All these runners finished within two minutes after Goffberg crossed the line.
In 1929 "Moon" Mullins, Notre Dame fullback, gained only one inch in-line play against Navy, but it scored game-winning touchdown.
