(Continued From Page Three) assistance on one occasion by Guard Wade Mori, batted down ten, intercepting two. More than mere mention should be made of the outstanding play of the ends—Bairantovich and Alter in particular. Their smart defensive end play kept Penn's backs from skating the wings for any gains, and on numerous occasions Alter broke up the play yards behind the line of scrimmage. The Bairon's downhill blocking was little short of perfect—he seemed to be on the spot just at the right time. Putting shot—Hometown Harry Harrison provided an expected thrill on that Windy Weat play 21 yards in the wrong direction when he was bottled up by Quakers, and then 45 yards in the right direction (aided by Bairantovich's beautiful block). Harry almost scored on another occasion when, on a punt return he got by the whole Penn team only to be nailed by the safety man. It's a shame that Ickes' lapse cost Harry the chance of a possible hero's role on the last play of the game.

Similar courses are now offered by the home economics department with its course on family relations, the School of Physical Education's hygiene classes, and the sociology department's advanced course on marriage and the family, Dr. Davis said. All the courses, however, he pointed out, are of an extremely scientific nature and said that there is a need for a more practical, less scientific course that would gather these points of view into a credit course on preparation for marriage and touch on all of the different phases. To the suggestion that the course might fail because students would schedule it merely to satisfy a morbid curiosity, Dr. Davis argued that the school is not primarily interested in motives. "Most other schools have courses of this nature and such a course would fill a very definite need here," Dr. Davis told the Collegian. Plans being laid by students to petition the administration for the adoption of a marriage course here were announced last week. It is possible that the petition will be started this week.
