Regulated Economy Necessary—Thomas

(Continued From Page One) in riots, confusion—possibly in the emergence of one or another kind of dictatorship.

Weakest point of Roosevelt's program, Thomas added, is his "inconsistent foreign policy" which is not being directed "toward keeping America at peace."

He warned of three specific policies which would be destined to lead America into war.

1—The "rearmament" program, which, he said, is "dangerous and points in the way of armament economies."

2—Discretionary neutrality, which would give the President "dictatorial power over the road to war."

3—The President's "bitter and relentless opposition" to the Ludlow Resolution providing for popular vote on a declaration of war, except in case of "imminent invasion."

"I warn your generation," Thomas said, "against the dangerous notion that America can get the moral satisfaction of punishing aggressors and enjoying trade with the innocents without suffering the pain of war."

Thomas appeared under the auspices of Forensic Council. He was introduced by Fred S. Carlson '39, who chairmanned the forum.

Hartswick—Rules which student occupants do not like: 1—no wrestling in house; 2—no card playing; 3—no phone calls after 10; 4—no tacks on wall; 5—no smoking in bed; 6—absolute quiet after 9 (Each student must be in his own room); 7—no visitors after 9; 8—no radios in rooms.

West College—floors dirty, strong odor of cooking, bathroom dirty. Also West College—unpleasant odor.

South Allen—unsanitary conditions; crowded. S. Sowers—too cold, crowded, small bungalow.

N. Patterson—facilities for good sanitation inadequate. Another on N. Patterson—poor sanitary conditions.

S. Pugh—dingy, dirty apartments. E. College—students complain of workmen being dirty.

RENTS The range of rents extended from \$2.00 for half of a double room to \$4.50. Single rooms, averaged \$3 a week, and in some cases reached \$5.

(Continued From Page One) agers of enterprises, oversee affairs of the student body, and provide by resolution directions for the conduct of any activity of enterprise.

The GENERAL MANAGER is employed by the Council, and is given responsibility for the business management of the association. The Council and President declare business and activity policy; the Manager administers business (and athletic) policy, and the student officials carry out activity policy. The Manager is somewhat comparable to the manager in Council-Manager cities.

There are many important aspects of student government which cannot be touched upon here. Naturally it would be stupid to transplant the system outlined above merely because it works well on the Pacific coast. But with such a background, and with brief acquaintance with the Penn State set-up, the following appear pertinent questions regarding the existing organization.

1—Does not the co-existence of Student Board and Student Council give rise to confusion and duplication?

2—Why does not women suffrage exist in the selection of so-called class presidents?

3—Would no one run for class offices if all remunerations and cuts were eliminated? (West-Central student presidents oversee businesses handling \$500,000 per year and more without any compensation.)

4—Would not the creation of a popularly-elected chief executive add to the prestige of the student body and correct existing diffusion of responsibility?
