Tribunal Dictum Already In Effect; Fight Feb. 14

Any freshman found guilty of not wearing customs will be forced to wear customs until the end of the second semester, in June. That was the decision handed down Tuesday night by Student Tribunal. It goes into effect immediately and will continue until customs are lifted.

Tribunal made the increase in punishment with the realization that many freshmen are not wearing customs, according to members of the group.

The date for the lifting of customs for all freshmen except those found guilty under the new ruling is February 14, provided that the freshmen win the annual freshman boxing meet which will be held that night.

Freshmen and sophomores wishing to compete for positions on their respective mit teams should report to Paul Gies '40 at the boxing ring at 4 o'clock tonight. Candidates have been working out daily with several men showing promise.
