Student Exchange to Remain Open Until February 15 In Library Room

The second annual student book exchange being conducted in the reserve book room in the basement of the library will be open from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. each day until Wednesday, Feb. 15, Edward Hedba '39, chairman of the exchange, announced yesterday.

The exchange was inaugurated last year under the sponsorship of the Independent Party. Students may purchase textbooks at prices up to 23 per cent of their original value when new. A five cent service charge is collected from both buyer and seller of a book is sold, no charge being made if the book is not sold.

Students upon leaving a book at the exchange will receive a receipt for the book and will be told to call back in five days to ascertain if their book has been sold.

Peel, in commenting on last year's exchange, stated that it was a success with students realizing savings as high as a dollar per book. Nine hundred and fifteen books changed hands during the time the exchange remained open last year.

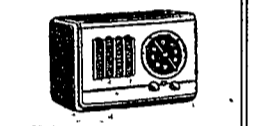

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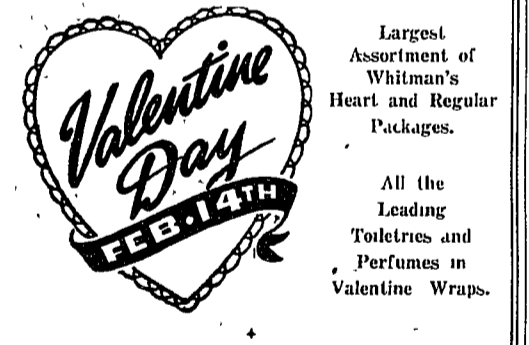

New Art Show To Open Here

New York Display To Begin Saturday; Prof. Helme Will Speak Feb. 15

The person who has constantly placed art on a pedestal and has looked for it only in expensive works in museums and private collections will be surprised upon viewing the new art exhibit beginning Saturday in the College Art Gallery, Room 404, Main Engineering, according to Prof. J. B. Helme of the division of fine arts, which sponsors the display.

The exhibit, "Useful Objects Under Five Dollars," is a traveling display of the Museum of Modern Art of New York City and consists of 200 usable, inexpensive articles which have been chosen because of their artistic appeal and functional excellence.

Compiling this display as a project toward teaching the public to find art in available, low-priced, everyday objects, the Museum based its selections upon such characteristics as uniformity, precision, new forms, new materials, and functional designs.

On Tour
Previous to its showing here the exhibit will complete showings in New York City, Saratoga Springs, N. Y., Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. Upon leaving State College on February 29 the exhibit will be shown in Chicago and Los Angeles.

Among the articles included in the display are a towel rack, a transparent hat box, an ash tray, a fish dinner, a pocket knife and several cigarette boxes.

In connection with this display, Prof. Helme will deliver the second of the group of Fine Arts Lectures. He will speak on "Art in Useful Objects" at 7:30 p. m. on Wednesday, Feb. 15.

Prof. Helme will begin his talk with a brief introduction in Room 107, Main Engineering immediately following this the audience will be taken to the Gallery where Prof. Helme will explain the exhibit and will answer any questions which may arise.

'School Pawn Plan' Blasted By Ex-Senator

GSA Advocate Attacks Policy Which Doomed Second Grant For College

Assailing Governor Arthur H. James' stand on the General State Authority's second institutional building program, Edward Jackson Thompson, former State Senator from this district and author of the State Authority, last week charged James was condemning the whole thing because it was a Democratic measure.

The program, which was dropped temporarily near the end of the Earle administration because of lack of PWA funds, included provision for another \$5,000,000 building grant for the College.

Of this, \$2,500,000 was tacked on by Thompson himself for two men's dormitories and another women's dormitory. An additional million was included later for a cafeteria.

"There is absolutely no substantiation for the Governor's contention that the school replacement program should be dropped because the federal government would have a mortgage on the Pennsylvania school system," Thompson said.

The PWA merely offered an outright 45 per cent grant, Thompson added, with no strings attached.

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Emery Issues 3 New Rulings

ROTC Students Allowed Cut: Riflers Get 2 Bonuses; Divisions Split Up

Continuing his campaign to improve military training here, Colonel Ambrose R. Emery, newly appointed head of the College ROTC unit, has inaugurated the following three new rulings to take effect the second semester.

1—Freshmen and sophomores enrolled in the basic ROTC course will be allowed one unexcused absence from class or drill and will not be required to make up the work missed, no penalty being inflicted for this cut.

2—Pershing Rifles, basic course ROTC group, will be given a five point bonus both first and second semester.

3—In the basic course, students enrolled in the infantry will be separated from the engineers. There will be no actual change in training except during the second semester of the sophomore year, at which time engineers will be given special training in tent pitching and rigging, while infantrymen will continue the normal course.

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
