ly, six-one 198-pound sophomore, at guards, Rizzi led Georgetown's undefeated freshman five in scoring last year.  
Lawthet would not say definitely who he would start against the Hoyas, but a probable combination will be Eddie Sapp and Charley Piosset in the front line and Johnny Bari, Bill Stopper and Cliff McWilliams in the back line.  
With diminutive Eddie Sapp leading the assault, the Nittany-men reduced Dr. Carlson's Golden Panther's to the least common denominator and solved Pitt's defensive attack without much trouble. Sapp poured 13 points into the netting, five goals from the field and three from the foul line, to sweep all scoring honors.  
Ahead of all of the way, the Lawthetmen led 17-9 at halftime. Major feature of the Lions' triumph was their amazing skill from the foul line. In 16 charity throws the Nittanymen sank fifteen Bill Stopper collected fouls, Sapp, Piosset, and Bari three each, McWilliams and Moffatt one apiece. Norm Raussen was charged with the only miss.  
State's defensive attack, clicking as per specification, allowed no Pitt man to get more than four points for the entire 40 minutes of play. Offensively, the Lions were stronger than they have been anytime since their Conference opener with Tech three weeks ago.

to back the men in any housing reform.  
Both timed the housing situation in State College as a "crisis," pointing out that the Collegian survey had uncovered flagrant conditions in rooming houses, that with room for only 319 more students available next semester and an increase of at least 300 in enrollment appearing imminent, the rooming problem would assume critical proportions.  
Advocating the establishment of a Student Housing Board, composed of a representative from each group present, Roth broadly outlined the functions of the Board as a hub of student housing action. An amendment to the motion by Moskalko which proposed that a representative of the townspeople be included in the organization was unanimously adopted by the group after discussion.  
The town representative, it was indicated, would be chosen by Borough authorities and would be included in the next session to be held next week.  
Indications were that more specific action would be taken at succeeding confabs, since the College Senate Committee on Student Welfare is expected to meet within two weeks to begin discussions as a basis for a recommendation to President Hazel on quality housing.
