Through an extensive survey conducted by doctors and anthropologists at Haivard University and at the University of Cinem-

nati several years ago, it was re-vealed that the average height of the American college student is in-

the American college student is in-creasing at the rate of one inch every 32 years. This sharply con-trasts the rate here, where the in-crease this year over last year's average was 247 inches, or 79 04 inches in 32 years if the rate re-mained constant.

The average weight of the Penn State co-ed is 122 38 pounds, while her average height is 62 80 inches. The tallest freshman boy at Penn State is 75 50 inches high; the shoitest, 61 75 The heaviest freshman weighs 290 pounds; the lightest, 99 pounds It is interesting to note that 81 of the boys of the class of 1942 are above six feet tall The tallest student at the college is 78 inches high The youngest freshman here is 15 years of age, while the oldest
