ceive the \$476,130 which the GSA
has promised for fixed equipment.
The Authority already has pro-
vided \$64,976.55 for equipment of
this nature, installation of which
will begin as soon as possible. The
additional grant of \$476,130, an-
nounced just a few days ago, is
not so sure to materialize, how-
ever.

The fate of the grant rests per-
haps upon the outcome of the
struggle now on for control of the
Authority. Governor James has
ousted two members appointed by
Earle, thereby swinging the bal-
ance of power to the Republicans.
The ousted members refuse to vacate
their positions, however, claim-
ing that the Governor has no
authority to fire them.

Democrats Would OK Grant
Should the Democratic members
win, there is no doubt but that
the grant for fixed equipment
would be assured, inasmuch as
they okayed it in the first place
in an effort to carry out Earle's
institutional improvement pro-
gram as far as possible.

On the other hand, should
James win out and appoint two
Republicans, there is the chance
that the new members, naturally
in accord with the Governor's eco-
nomy drive, might refuse to ap-
prove this bid for installation of
the equipment and scuttle the
plans entirely.

The whole immediate future of
the College, therefore, depends
upon what happens in Harrisburg
during the next two months.

statistics have been gathered on
this subject which seem to show
conclusively that property crimes
are largely the result of the un-
equal distribution of wealth.
No one familiar with courts and
prisons can fail to observe the
close relation between poverty and
crime. And, as Darrow says else-
where, "nearly all the inmates of
penal institutions are without
money. This is true of almost all
men who are placed on trial."

Hence the large number of
youthful criminals and hence also
the large percentage of habitual
offenders. Millions of youths leave
our schools every year looking in
vain for an opportunity to render
the services which society does
not want, millions of others are
made jobless by fluctuations in the
cycles of our business life beyond
their control while millions of
heads of families are made des-
perate by the same ruthless force.

It has not been many years now
since we in America have recog-
nized a social responsibility for
the problem of poverty by pro-
viding relief and social security.
How many more years must
pass before we shall revolutionize
our theories of responsibility for
crime? How much longer will we
continue to persecute the poor for
the sins of our society? When will
we have rational crime prevention
rather than retributive punish-
ment? Is it cheaper to waste 15
billion dollars annually on crime
than to alter the present inequi-
table distribution of wealth and in-
come that plays such a tragic role
in filling our courts and jails with
its unwitting victims?
