Changes In Constitution

All-College Cabinet shall be re-elected to the governmental organs specified under Article I, Section 2.

Article III, Section 1 The judicial powers relative to men students shall be vested in the Student Tribunal.

Article III, Section 2 The Student Tribunal shall be composed of seven male members, appointed by the All-College President and with the advice and consent of the Cabinet, six of whom must be seniors and one of whom must be a junior who shall automatically become chairman of Tribunal in his senior year.

Article III, Section 9 The judicial powers relative to women students shall be vested in the Judicial Committee, as shall be specified in the constitution of the Women's Student Government Association.

Article VI, Section 1 The Interclass Finance Board shall consist of two members of each class, including the class treasurer and one other representative of the opposite sex, to be appointed by the class president, by and with the advice and consent of Women's Student Government Association, if the appointee is to be a woman.

Article VI, Section 3 The Board shall draw up all class budgets subject to the approval of the Cabinet and the College Comptroller for the Administration.

Article VI, Section 4 The Finance of Women's Student Government Association and Women's Recreation Association shall be supplied by the women students and shall not be subject to the general supervision of the Interclass Finance Board.

Article VII, Section 1 The Interclass Treasurer shall handle all student class funds.

Article X The organization and functioning of all other governmental bodies specified in Article I, Section 2 shall be left to their respective members, but no constitution of any of these bodies shall be inconsistent with the provisions of this Constitution.

Article XI The right of any undergraduate student to vote or hold all-College offices shall not be denied or abridged on account of race, color, age, sex, or scholastic standing, except as otherwise herein provided.

(Continued From Page One) tialized boarding houses. A meeting place for the units in social and athletic activities would be provided by this system.

4—An Independent Men's Council, through which the non-fraternity men could express his ideas to the Administration. The Council would be composed of several representatives from each unit.

5—An opportunity to create a commendable social status between men and women by such means as exchange dinners, unit dances and afternoon socials.

6—The establishment of an "Independent Day" for the purpose of intensified competition among the unit athletic teams. Awards would be presented at an "all-independent banquet" which would climax the day.

7—An opportunity for non-fraternity men to gain sufficient recognition and authority to compete for varsity sport managementships.
