Still untied, the freshman baseball team will make a second attempt to open its season when it faces Kiski on New Beaver Field at 12:30 p. m. tomorrow.

After a fashion, the team did play its opener at Mercersburg Wednesday. But it was a sloppy, rain-drenched affair and ended after one and a half innings with the score knotted at 1-1.

For Kiski, Houck will make several changes in the lineup he chose for Mercersburg. Bill Deibel will get a chance at first base and Charley Medlar may draw the pitching assignment over Don DeManno. Leo expects to substitute others as the game progresses.

Penn State pigskin followers will get their last chance to see next year's Lions in action tomorrow when the Higginsmen close the spring training sessions with a regulation game against the Tommies from Scranton University. The game is scheduled for New Beaver Field at 2 p. m.

Though the hard coal boys should not prove too strong, for the Lions it will give the Blue and White fans their first chance to see some of the new faces in Lion helmets against outside opposition. Scranton U. coached by Tom Davies, will bring about 40 players to the game.

In a Wednesday scrimmage, with a Blue team playing offensively against a White one, it was unusual to note the heaviness of the Blue line as lined up at the opening of the scrimmage. 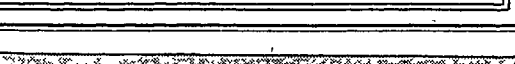
