Harry "The Light Horse" Harrison has been named the outstanding senior athlete for 1939 by the Lion coaching staff.

The naming of Harrison to this honor culminates the achievements of the former West Hill senior in addition combination since Winds was the recipient of this award last year.

The flashy Harrison known for his spectacular grid playing, is also shortstop on the varsity baseball team. "Hairbreadth" Harry probably will long be remembered for his broken field running and pass catching. He served as president of the Athletic Association this year.

Teaming with West in the backfield two seasons ago Harry came through with the winning tally in the waning seconds of play against Maryland. In the fall of 1936 the diminutive Lion ran a second quarter kick off back 95 yards for a touchdown against Penn. It was such feats that won for him the Outstanding Athlete Award.

made of interest paid on actual indebtedness, taxes, special assessments for local improvements, inheritance taxes, contributions for charitable, religious and educational organizations of a non-profit character (provided they do not exceed 15 percent of the net income computed before deducting donations), and professional expenses.

Credits and exemptions to be taken against net income (gross income less allowable deductions) are:

a Personal exemption of \$2,500 for married person or head of family and \$1,000 for single individuals.

b Credit of \$400 for dependents under 18 years of age. Credit may also be claimed for dependents over 18 if such persons are mentally or physically incapable of self support.

c Earned net income credit.

Undefeated was the word for the varsity golfers as last week ended and they rode roughshod over two powerful opponents, W. & J. and Pitt by duplicate scores, 6-3, 6-3.

W & J put up the hardest struggle, but their best was not good enough for a group of six Nittany Lions, who, flushed with two trample victories over Rutgers and Army, looked around for more foes to meet, to play, and to conquer.

In the W & J match, Jack Mahaffey suffered his first defeat of the season when he was conquered by John Heitzog, 2 and 1. Bud Miller avenged the loss by a 3 and 1 win over John Blair. Bill Gross, playing number three for the varsity had a hard tussle with Joe Breckenstein before he finally overcame him, 1 up, on the twenty-first hole. Ken Klingensmith took his match from Bob Carpenter, 2 and 1, while Jack Bland had little trouble with his opponent, winning 5 and 4. Ed Hebl, all-luck dogging his trail, hit everything but members of the opposing team with his golf ball, as it landed in sand traps, ditches and woods on the last nine to lose the match, 2 and 1.

In the Pitt meet, the going was somewhat easier for the Blue and White. Pitt offered some competition, but not too much as State took advantage of its day to win, and did rather nicely.

The State line-up was the same except for the sixth John McNeely, the team's playing manager stepped into Ed Hebl's post and defeated his opponent, Charles Mathias 5 and 4. Jack Mahaffey lost to Tony Jay 3 and 2 with Bill Gross once more avenging the defeat by winning from his man, this time footballer Bill Daddio, 1 up. Bill Gross increased the Lion lead by taking Bill Reilly 2 up. Ken Klingensmith sealed the victory by winning from Homer McClintock 1 and 3, and Jack Bland won from Bob Saybold 6 and 5 to complete the romp.
