## Marquardt Poll Shows 3-2 Dissent

### Opposition To \$2 Price Increase Revealed Even Stronger

The introduction of a popular dance orchestra on next year's Artists' Course is opposed by a two-thirds majority of present subscribers, according to a survey recently conducted by Dr. Carl E. Marquardt, chairman of the Artists' Course Committee.

Three hundred and forty seven students voted "No" on the question, said Dr. Marquardt, while 168 voted "Yes." Among non-student voters, 232 opposed the addition of a dance orchestra and 114 supported it.

On the question of an increase of \$2 or \$2.50 to make possible the inclusion of such a popular number, negative opinion was even stronger. Dr. Marquardt declared only 18 per cent of those polled were in favor of the increase.

Tolerance—he had it. When the Duke Ellington episode came the fore and he attacked the intolerance and bigotry it displayed, letters came to Tronovitch—typical of which was the following from an Ohio clergyman.

"Let me thank you for your editorial on 'The Source of Democracy' in the February 24 issue. In style it was worthy of a piece on any editorial page. A statement of principle it was superb."

"The letter from Dr. Schott of the Physical Education School, excerpts of which follow, is also typical.

"During your administration as Editor, I always read your editorials with keen interest. With some I disagreed. With the rest I was in entire accord. Perhaps, if I had the information at hand that you had when you wrote those editorials with which I disagreed I would more than likely have been in accord. You have had a difficult task. . . you always stated your position very clearly and fearlessly. . . for this I admire you. I am convinced that not once did you have an ulterior motive in presenting a point of view. . . your criticism was always timely and in the interest of a good cause.

"You going will be a personal loss to me. My only regret is that I did not learn to know you better."

Born, August 23, 1919 in the heart of the anthracite region, Jessup Carpatho-Russian descent. finished eight years of grade school in six years even though he was out a half-year because of appendicitis. met a girl in eighth grade. four years later got up enough courage to tell her he liked her. (P.S.—it's all off now) decided on journalism in senior year of high school. inspiration was Joe Polakoff, sports editor of Scranton Tribune, who kept encouraging him. on his own hook published "The Patriot," weekly typewritten news sheet. could write only sports before he came to State. Polakoff in his office once told him, "Don't get into journalism unless you have it in your blood!" John snapped back at him, "Gee, I can't stay out of here!" graduated from high school when 15 years of age. Jack Bowman of Eng Comp Dept taught him how to argue, marshalled his facts. president of the Commons Club his junior year, national editor of the Club sophomore and junior years.

Teems his policies as liberal. strong FDR man but disagrees with the New Deal foreign policy and its bitter anti-business measures. hates William Green, Congressman Dies, Hamilton Fish. admires Senator Norris, Hopkins, Boiah, Norman Thomas. closest friend is Roy Nichols, retiring managing editor of the Collegian. Lou Bell is his choice for best all-around prof. . . admires liberal younger element of faculty—McHenry, Pundt, Ferguson, etc. biggest thrill of his life was when he was presented a ring by the Junior Board for his outstanding work on the Collegian. his eyes clouded with tears and for the first time in his life he couldn't speak. honor societies and reorganization campaigns gave him most fun. member of Sigma Delta Chi, Pi Gamma Mu, Student Board, Student Council, Student Union Board, Forensic Council. has been offered reportorial positions with Pittsburgh Press, Scranton Tribune.

In an attempt to guard against Senior Class dissension in future years the Board voted unanimously to set up the following regulations to announce the meeting twice in the Collegian, to hold an open forum at least one week before the selection of the gift and to select two projects for the gift, and to have the balloting conducted on voting machines in conjunction with the all-College elections and subject to the regulations thereof.

### Leitzell Hits Collegian Edit

### Denies Borough Collected \$90 From College To Repair Damaged Street

Burgess Leitzell denied today the charge made in a recent editorial of the Collegian that borough authorities had collected \$90 from the College for damages done to the intersection at Allen Street and College Avenue during a student demonstration last September.

The editorial, entitled, "In the Spring," declared that the borough had agreed to repair the street as soon as the football season was over, but had neglected to do so. It called upon the borough to immediately make repairs or refund the money to the student body.

Leitzell, speaking for the borough council stated that it had received no money.

"An agreement was made between the college and the borough to wait until school had closed for the Summer before street repairs would be made," he declared.
