## 2 Loan Funds Are Approved

**\$650 Bouche Memorial Fund, \$500 York Fund Made Available Here**

Two new student loan funds, one of \$650 and one of \$500, have been approved by the Board of Trustees, President Ralph D. Hetzel announced yesterday.

The Bouche Memorial Loan Fund of \$650 has been donated by friends and faculty associates of Dr. O. F. Bouche, head of the department of economics from 1923 until his death in 1935.

It provides that a sum of \$200 be loaned each year to a student desiring to pursue graduate study in economics. The student is to be selected by a committee consisting of the dean of men, the dean of the graduating school, and the head of the department of economics.

A loan fund of \$500 has been donated by the Penn State Alumni Club of York County. It is to be known as the York County Penn State Loan Fund, and only seniors from York County will be eligible.

## Professor Writes Yearbook Article

Prof. Charles C. Peters, director of educational research, has contributed an article on "Aims and Objectives of Education" to the annual joint yearbook of the National Education Association and the American Educational Research Association.

Professor Peters is also serving as chairman of a periodic publication, The Review of Educational Research.

## Ewell Runs Best When His Feet Are Sores

**"My feet hurt"**

That's all yeasting sprint ace Baine Ewell had to say last Friday after having set a new freshman record in the 100-yard dash, tied the varsity record for the same distance, and equaled the freshman record for the 220-yard sprint.

Baine was clocked in 9.6 seconds for the century. That knocked 2 seconds off the freshman record set by Bartholomew '28, and tied the varsity record first set by Henry '07 and later equaled by Bartholomew. Bartholomew also holds the club record for the 220—21.4 seconds—and the varsity record of 21.2 for the same distance.

Ewell, who was clocked in 9.6 seconds for the 100 while still in high school down in Lancaster, also had foot trouble during the winter. His "feet hurt him" when he broke the world's record for the 50-yard dash in the Penn A C meet in Philadelphia.

His fleet foundations troubled him as he took second in the Millrose games in New York City. Tomorrow, Baine is running his first official race as a member of the freshman track team.

If his feet bother him—look out! He's liable to break a few more world records.
