Unbeaten Wyoming In Way Of Perfect Season For 1942 Nine

An unbeaten foe, Wyoming Seminary, is the only thing in the way of a perfect season for Leo Houck's freshman baseballers, and that issue of supremacy will be decided on New Beaver Field at 12:30 p. m. tomorrow.

If the Cubs win—and Leo thinks they will—they will have the only perfect record racked up by any Penn State team this spring and will be the first unbeaten freshman baseball squad since 1936.

The Seminary team boasts a record of five straight wins while State has three. For the finale, Joe Wilk, who pitched two innings before rain halted the Pitt game last Saturday, will start on the mound with Don DelManzo, early season starter, held in reserve.

Although he pitched himself into a hole in both innings last week, Wilk had begun to collect himself and struck out two men in the second.

Definitely scheduled to see action tomorrow is Warren Zeigler, another early season starter out of the lineup for the last several games. He will alternate at first with Bill Deblie.

Fraternities Are Seen On Defensive--Warnock

Dean Urges Personnel Changes For Stronger IFC; Body Will Seek Cabinet Post As President Is Ineligible

Fraternities will be on the defensive next year. Every year fewer freshmen pledge. Scholarship, political and financial troubles are menacing fraternity existence.

Thus spoke Dean of Men Althim R. Warnock in a speech before Interfraternity Council Tuesday night.

Opportunities for rebuilding and strengthening fraternities, however, are good, the dean declared. He recommended more cooperation between houses, and a stronger bid for the support of faculty and local alumni as means of achieving this end.

"You need a shift in fraternity personnel," Dean Warnock told the group. "Get 10 percent more serious-minded boys in and 10 percent of the undesirable out, and you'll be in a much stronger position."

Dean Urges Cooperation

Interfraternity Council should be made a more effective body next year, Dean Warnock pointed out. He urged that IFC and the Fraternity Councils' Association link themselves more closely together.

It was decided at the meeting to petition the All-College Cabinet to admit an Interfraternity Council Representative, since President Frank C. Anderson, Jr., who would normally occupy the post, is ineligible. All-College President Howard C. McWilliams, present at the meeting, expressed his approval of the move.

William R. Walker '40 was named chairman of the committee on rushing for next year. Others named on the committee by Anderson include Donald J. Eyer '40, Thomas H. Amisworth '41, Edward A. Harris '41, and Erik S. Moeller '41.

domitories housing 500, a cafeteria for 1,000, a wing to the infirmary, and additional boiler and power house space to provide for College facilities.

As it now stands approved by the Secretary of Properties and Supplies Roger W. Rowland, alterations to the original plans must be made.

An additional appropriation of approximately 1 1/2 millions for further expansion of physical facilities, also approved by the Ealey regime, is believed indefinitely shelved in view of Secretary Rowland's statement that the present administration was seeking "to develop a program of public works that will provide employment and effect savings, rather than add \$15,000,000 or \$20,000,000 to the state's expenses through an institutional building program." The 1 1/2-million-dollar appropriation "would not be self-liquidating, inasmuch as only non-income-bearing buildings were slated to be built."
