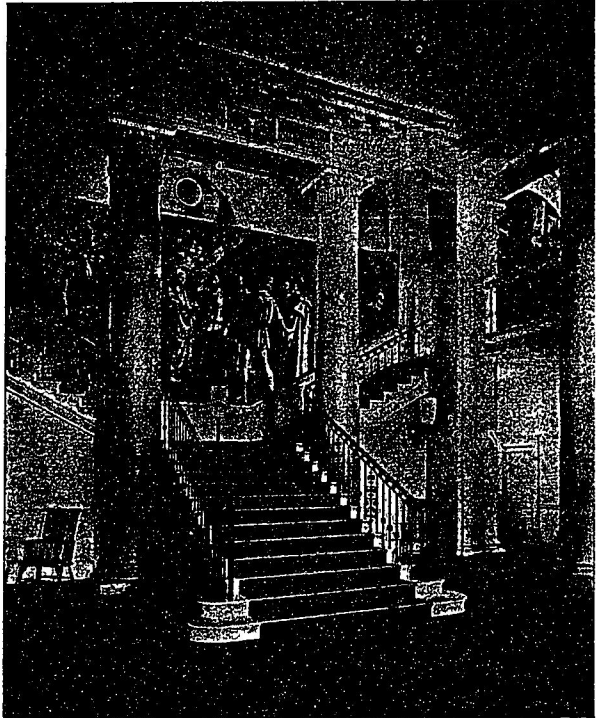

## Hibshman Counters New Alumni Drive

Alumni Secretary Points To Parallel Purposes Of Association And Plans Of Troanovitch, Boal; Urges Cooperation

Pointing out that the Alumni Association program is "really parallel to the one which you propose," Edward K. Hibshman, Alumni Secretary, in a letter to John A. Troanovitch '39 and Thomas A. Boal '39, yesterday called on all proponents of the Alumni Committee of 100' plan to "bring the influence and enthusiasm of your group to support this program, rather than set up one of your own."

The letter by Hibshman was prompted by a report from Pittsburgh in the last issue of the Summer Collegian, stating that a drive "to resurrect the alumni from their lethargy in relation to the academic, social, administrative, and athletic problems of the College" was in the offing.

The drive, to be initiated by Troanovitch and Boal, calls for a limited Committee of 100 active members, to be recruited from the ranks of recent outstanding graduates from all parts of the country.

Primary purpose of the organization would be to obtain the establishment of a "centralized and aggressive employment bureau" by the College which would continually keep its fingers on the pulse of private employment, seeking not only for those who expect to be graduated but also for those already graduated.

Besides, the tentative platform of action lists:

- 1—Cultivation of better public relations.
- 2—Improvement of intra-school relations, including faculty, students, administration, and alumni.
- 3—Elevation of academic standards.
- 4—Establishment of a faculty "merit system."
- 5—Dissolution of "unhealthy inter-school friction."
- 6—Announcement of and strict adherence to a definite athletic policy "to eliminate suspicion and distrust generated by the present ignorance of the public, faculty, undergraduates and alumni."

Excerpts from Hibshman's letter: "Your letter contains many helpful suggestions, most of which, however, have been carefully discussed by the Alumni Council."

## Dance To Follow Ceremony Set For 8:00 P. M. Tomorrow; Instructions Are Released

Procession To Form In Old Main At 7:40; Will Begin At 7:55

Instructions for the Summer Session Commencement, announced yesterday by C. E. Bullinger, College Marshal, are as follows:

1 Summer Session Commencement will be held Thursday evening, August 10, at 8:00 p. m., Daylight Saving Time, in the Auditorium.

2 Candidates for Bachelors Degrees will meet in the first floor lounge of Old Main at 7:40 p. m. DST Candidates for advanced degrees will meet in the second floor lounge of Old Main at 7:40 p. m. DST The Commencement procession will begin promptly at 7:55 DST Hats and coats will be under guard in the lounges of Old Main during the Commencement exercises.

Bachelor Degree Rules

For those receiving bachelors degrees:

3 Academic costume will be required for commencement.

4 On entering the place of assemblage, remain standing until given a signal by the College Marshal or presiding officer.

5 Men remove caps during the invocation only, but wear them at all other times.

6 When the dean of your school concludes his presentation of the candidates in your school, rise and remain standing.

7 The President will then confer the degree, after which make the academic salute by moving the assel with the right hand to the left front side of the cap.

Remain Standing

8 At the signal from the College Marshal, follow him, in double file, and receive diplomas from the President, then return to your seats and remain standing until given a signal by the College Marshal.

9 The diploma issued at graduation is a dummy. The actual diploma will be delivered to each graduate in exchange for the dummy he received from the President. The exchange will take place at the Registrar's office immediately after the Commencement proceedings.

For those receiving advanced degrees, paragraphs 4, 5, 6, 8, and 9 will apply. The tassel of the cap will be worn on the left front side. Your academic salute will consist of merely a bow to the President at the time of receiving the diploma.

## Work Is Resumed On All Buildings After 2-Week Halt

Following more than a two-week halt in construction due to a jurisdictional strike of the carpenters on the project, work was resumed last week after an agreement was reached between the General State Authority officials and the Union officials.

Inspections Yesterday

Ten of the eleven buildings in the current College \$5,000,000 building program are completely ready for the installation of fixed equipment, McCloskey and Company, contractors, announced yesterday.

The resumption of work will enable completion of the buildings before final inspections, originally slated for yesterday.

The strike, caused by a dispute as to whether carpenters or steel workers were to install window screens, affected the Coco Screen Company, McCloskey and Company, and other contractors who themselves were not involved in the cause of the strike.

Which of the two trades will eventually install the screens was still doubtful today as an arbitration board, representing the unions concerned and the carpenters, attempted settlement.

## Borough Will Vote On Beer

Pittsburgh Decision May Affect State Referenda; Injunction Is Denied

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 9.—State College will most likely vote on September 12 whether or not the borough is to retain beer.

That possibility was strengthened today as Common Pleas Judge John P. Egan yesterday refused an injunction which sought to block state-wide wet and dry referenda on the grounds the law forbids a referendum at any primary occurring at least 60 days before the November election.

Judge Egan ruled it is the duty of the court "to adopt the construction of the law which will make effective the intention of the legislature." He took the position that the legislature meant to allow local option votes at any primary, regardless of the 60-day clause.

His ruling was awaited with interest by wet and dry forces throughout the state as hundreds of communities prepared to vote at the September 12 primary on local option on the liquor question.

In a test case, Jacob W. Kram, an East McKeesport liquor dealer, had sought the injunction against the referendum on the ground that there are less than 60 days between the primary this year and the general election, while the law provides a 60-day period must intervene.

Judge Egan's decision may pave the way for dismissing similar injunction requests in other counties.
