

Hibshman Counters New Alumni Drive

Alumni Secretary Points, To Parallel Purposes Of Association And Plans Of Troanovitch, Boal; Urges Cooperation

Pointing out that the Alumini Association program is "really parallel to the one which you propose," Edward K Hibshman, Alumni Secretary, in a letter to John A Tioanovitch '39 and Thomas A Boal 39, yesterday called on all proponents of the Alumni Committee of 100' plan to "bring the influence and enthusiasm of your group to support this program, rather than set up one of your own

The letter by Hibshman was prompted by a report from Pitts-burgh in the last issue of the Summer Colleg an, stating that a drive "to resurrect the alumni from

"to lesurrect the alumn from then lethargy in relation to the scademic, social, administrative, and athletic problems of the Colege" was in the offing

The drive, to be init ated by Iroanovitch and Boal, calls for a limited Committee of 100 active members, to be recruited from the lanks of recent outstanding graduates from all parts of the country

Primary purpose of the organization would be to obtain the establishment of a "centralized and aggressive employment buteau" by the College which would continually keep its fingers on the pulse of private employment, seeking not only for those who expect to be graduated but also for those al-
