

Men's Rushing Code

Article I Definitions
 Section I Rushing shall mean any contact or communication between fraternity man and rushee.
 Section II Fraternity man shall mean any active, pledge, or alumna member of any fraternity.
 Section III Rushee shall mean any member of the class of 1943 except those who enter with advanced standing. The records of the College Registrar shall be used to verify this standing.
 (a) Two year agricultural students shall be bound by the code.
 Section IV Summer Rushing shall mean any rushing between June 12 and September 13, 1939.
 Section V Silent Period shall mean that there shall be no contact or communication between fraternity man and rushee.
 Section VI Open Rushing shall mean any contact or communication between fraternity man and rushee other than in the fraternity house or on its premises.
 Section VII Formal Rushing shall mean any rushing during first period except that prohibited by the regulations.
 Section VIII Intensive Rushing shall mean any rushing in the second period except that prohibited by the regulations. Intensive rushing dates are not binding on either fraternity or rushee.
 Section IX The Judiciary Committee shall mean a committee of three faculty members appointed by the president of I F C.

Article III Regulations
 Section I There shall be no summer pledging during summer rushing.
 Section II Rushing shall be confined to the hours limits except authorized parties.
 (a) To receive authorization, the fraternity must present to the Judiciary Committee a petition in writing stating the place of the party and the nature of it.
 Section III The Judiciary Committee shall have final word on the authorization of our town rushing parties.
 Section IV Rushing shall not be conducted in any beer distributing establishment.
 (a) No intoxicating beverages shall be used in any manner in rushing.
 Section V No women shall be used in rushing.
 (a) Women shall not be present in fraternity houses at anytime that rushees are present.
 Section VI Dates shall be made by the name of the fraternity and the written signature of the person making the date appearing on the date card.
 Section VII Each fraternity shall be allowed to sign for only two dates during formal rushing.
 Section VIII Signing for second period dates may not take place until after second date of first period. These dates are not binding.
 Section IX Any rushee not pledged on Monday, Sept 25, by 8 P. M. may not be pledged by any house for a period of thirty days following its formal pledging.
 (a) A house penalized one day in formal pledging may not pledge again until October 28.
 (b) A house penalized three days may not pledge again until October 28.
 (c) A house penalized six days may not pledge again until October 31.
 Section X The Judiciary Committee shall be composed of either fraternity men who do not have a chapter on the Penn State Campus or non-fraternity men.
 Section XI Each member of the Judiciary Committee shall be paid out of treasury of I F C a sum not exceeding \$15.00 as a consideration for service rendered.
 Section XII The Judiciary Committee shall investigate any viola-

tion reported to it, and its members shall investigate on their own enforcement of the code.
 Section XIII When the Judiciary Committee finds any member or members of any fraternity guilty of violating this code, it shall be found to impose at least the minimum penalty.
Article IV Penalties for Violations
 Section I The penalties for violation of this code in any manner shall be the postponement of pledging by one day three days, or six days depending upon the nature of the offense.
 (a) The penalty shall be left to the discretion of the Judiciary Committee.
 Section II The penalty for violations not reported until after pledging has taken place shall be the payment of a \$50.00 fine.
 (a) If the fine is not paid within a week after conviction, social privileges shall be suspended for one semester.

 The same afternoon arrangements for dates will be sanctioned.
 Rushees, however, will not be permitted in fraternity houses or on premises until formal rushing begins with the first luncheon date at 11 a m Saturday.
 Following a week of formal rushing, rushees will fill out preference cards at Student Union Office in Old Main from 8 a m until 5 p m Friday, September 22. Fraternities will then get their preference cards at 8 p m.
 Actual pledging is scheduled for 5 p m Monday.
 A three-man Judiciary Committee, consisting of faculty members not affiliated with fraternities which have chapters here, shall investigate any violation of the code. Each member will be paid a sum not exceeding \$15 by the Interfraternity Council.
 Upon finding any fraternity guilty of a code violation, the committee is obliged to impose at least a minimum penalty as specified in the code.
Don't Carve Desks, Freshmen Requested
 The cooperation of the incoming freshmen is requested in refraining from carving fraternity insignia, initials, etc., on desks, and tablet arms of all classrooms.

 established last April to help in remedying the situation and serve as intermediary between students and householders.
 Also organized, the Student Placement Bureau consisting of householders, agreed "to care for properly clean the room and bath, see that the room shall be properly heated and lighted, to permit reasonable use of telephone and to prevent unnecessary noise in the house."
 The Bureau drew up a formal printed agreement to be signed by the proprietor, student, parent or guardian and two witnesses. The agreement is made with the approval of the Dean of Men, Student Council the Student Housing Commission and may be qualified, altered, or terminated with the consent of both parties.
 Members of the Bureau are issued membership cards and freshmen are advised that rooming houses possessing such cards have been fully approved for use by students. A list of the officially approved houses will be posted at Student Union desk, Old Main.
 "The student, according to the contract, in addition to the rate for room and board which he agrees to pay, must "pay for any damage to the house or furnishings which he has incurred. Occupant further agrees not to permit gambling or intoxicating liquors in his room nor to indulge in disorderly conduct on the premises, nor to create or permit unnecessary noise in his room, nor to sublet his room during his temporary absence."
 "Take your time when you get in town and accept only rooms which are safe, sanitary, and conducive to good study," the Commission has advised.

1,608 Degrees Given At College During Past Academic Year
 A total of 1,608 advanced and baccalaureate degrees—the largest in the history of the College—were conferred during the past academic year of 1938-39, records at the office of Registrar William S. Hoffman revealed.
 Of the degrees granted last year, 1,310 were baccalaureate and 298 were advanced. Men students received 1,214, while women earned 364.
 Conferred at the three usual commencement programs held during the year, the degrees were presented as follows: regular June commencement, 1,157, mid-year commencement, 196, summer session (1938), 255.
 At the summer session recently completed, an increase of 38 degrees was seen as the number rose to 293. This figure is not included in the past academic year, but is an indication that the total number of degrees to be granted this coming year will surpass even last year's record.

\$4,000 Paris Prize Architect Awarded
 George A. Downs, a 1937 graduate of the College, was recently named winner of the annual Paris Prize competition of the Society of Beaux-Arts Architects.
 The cash award, valued at more than \$4,000, entitles Downs to two and one-half years' study in Europe.
