Women Hold First Offices

Shirm, Craighead, Barbey Occupy Class Posts.

For the first time in history, women are holding office this year in the student government.

The nomination of women for All College and class offices followed the adoption of the new All-College government set-up last year. The 1939 election was the first in which women students were permitted to vote.

Sarabell Shirm '40 is now All-College Vice-President, following a successful campaign on the independent ticket last spring. Other Independent women candidates now in office are Jean C. Craighead '41, junior class secretary, and Ruth W. Barbey, '42, sophomore class secretary.

Women who are automatically included on the new All-College Cabinet are Jane A. Romig '40, president of Women's Student Government, Junnata M. Chambers '40, president of Pan-Hellenic Council, and Mary H. O'Connor '40, president of Women's Reception Association.

As yet unchosen is the representative of non-fraternity women, who will be a member of the All-College Cabinet.
