Hillel Foundation Under Rabbi Gordon Has Made Great Progress Since 1937; Full Synagogue Equipment Is Available

Climaxing a phenomenal rise in status and membership since Rabbi Theodore Gordon assumed the directorship of the Hillel Foundation in September, 1937, the formal dedication of the new Hillel quarters will be held Friday and Saturday, September 29 and 30.

Dr. A. L. Sacha, national director of the Foundation, will attend the dedicatory ceremonies which will be highlighted by a special service Saturday morning and a dedication dance Saturday night.

The new location of the Foundation will be at 131 West Beaver Avenue. Included in its quarters will be a basement which will house an extensive recreation room, first floor—lounge, director's office, Room of Meditation and Library.

 The second floor will serve as the synagogue auditorium and will have a seating capacity of approximately 250. All necessary synagogue equipment will be available.

Former quarters of the Foundation included but two inadequate rooms in the Letzell building on West College Avenue.

Rabbi Gordon received his B.A. degree from the University of Minnesota in 1929, he performed rabbinical work at the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York, and attended Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, where he was awarded his rabbinical degree in 1933.

The director served as intercollegiate president of the Menorah Society and was associated with Rabbi Morris Lazoron, Baltimore, for four years before he accepted the head of the Foundation here.

Six Trustees Are Relected

Six members of the Board of Trustees of the College were re-elected over Commencement weekend with Robert H. Craig, of Harrisburg being the lone new member. All seven will serve three-year terms.

Those re-elected by the alumni of the College included Kenzie S. Eapshaw, of Hollidaysburg, John G. Benedict, of Waynesboro, Boyd A. Musser, of Scranton, H. W. Frenits, Jr., of Lancaster, Frank P. Wilts, of Ward, and James G. White, of New York City.

Craig was elected to replace William L. Affelder, of Pittsburgh.

The newly-elected men complete the College Board of Trustees of 31 members. The governor, president of the College, the state secretary of agriculture, and the state superintendent of public instruction are ex-officio members.

Six are appointed by the governor; nine are elected by the alumni, and 12 from delegates from county-wide agricultural and industrial societies in the state.

THE NEW STUDENT GOVERNMENT

This is the first in a series of explanatory articles concerning the development and actual function of the new student government which was set up last spring under the Constitution of the Pennsylvania State College Student Government Association.

With the College in an age of transit on and rapid growth of the student body, a long-needed reorganization of student government saw faint signs of reality on December 4, 1938.

At that time, a Constitutional Revision Committee was appointed by Student Council of the Men's Student Government.

They planned to reorganize the men's set-up.

For years there had been talk of revising, reorganizing, or "democratizing" student government. The phrases sounded so well that political demagogues proceeded to exploit them and make political capital out of the student body.

Three months passed in action. Then, on March 10, 1939, a proposed constitution, based on studies of the Revision Committee and a voluntary 4 man committee, was presented to Student Board and Student Council—and passed unanimously.

The Women's Student Government Association was immediately confronted with the task of considering the new arrangement. On the surface, it seemed to be subtracting powers from that organization as women, for the first time were to be given an opportunity to hold class office, along with the men.

Action was delayed by the Senate of WSGA on March 14 subject to additional investigation.

On March 21, a conference committee of both men and women student leaders adopted 12 clarifying revisions in the constitution. These were accepted by all participating organizations.

And so, with the first all-College election of all College officers, May 2, 3 and 4, the new student government was a reality.

Actual operation of the organization did not become effective until following the initial inaugural ceremonies held in Recreation Hall, May 23 when H. Clifton McWilliams, Jr. '40, was installed as All-College President.

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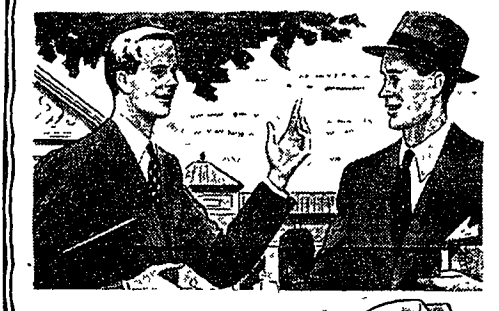
