Shows Drop Of \$8,900

A deficit of \$3,521.51 was realized by the Penn State Athletic Association during the year ending June 30, according to the an nual financial report released yes terday by Neil M Fleming, gradu ate manager of athletics

The deficit was a drop of an proximately \$8,900 over last year's surplus of \$5,393 19 -

Primary factor of the decided drop was a \$9,090 86 increase in expenditures which was brought about by an outlay of \$124,740 51 fon; conduction of intercollegiate sports as compared to approxi mately \$116,800 last year

Income Remains Same

With the aggregate income of \$145,757 20 remaining almost identical with the 1938 year, the rise in expenditures accounted for the difference Both the general asso-ciation expense of \$20,038 20 and ciation, expense of \$20,038 29 and the maintenance expense f New Beaver Field of \$4,500 remained about the same about the same

income received from student fees totaled \$82,501 53, ticket sales and guarantees, \$50,645 75; faculty season tickets, \$2,597, and miscellaneous income, \$12 93 Student fees showed an increase

The course is offered with no college credit in cooperation with the Federal Civil Aeronautics authority program to train 20,000
