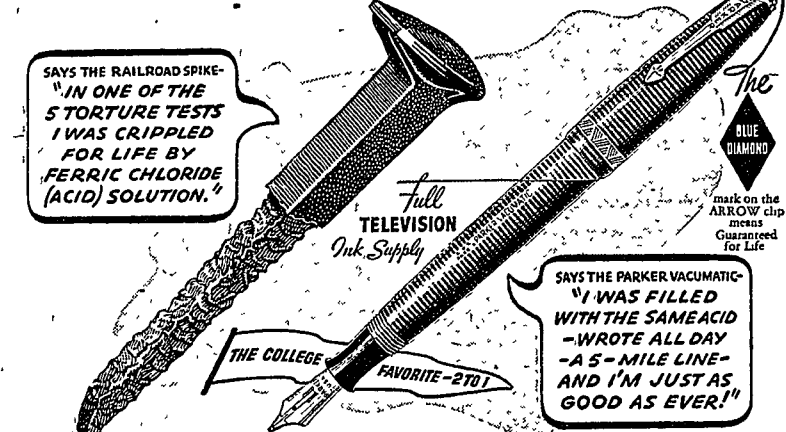
**Library Renewals By Mail Restricted**
