Charles M. Schwab, 77, College Donor, Ends Colorful Life

Charles M. Schwab 77, "King of steel" whose philanthropy built the \$250,000 Schwab Auditorium here will be buried today. He was a member of the College Board of Trustees from 1902 to 1912. A native of Loretto in nearby Cambria County, Schwab started life as a youth of modest family and rose to become one of the wealthiest and most colorful of America's business giants. He died in New York City last Monday night of coronary thrombosis. Spoke at Dedication With Andrew Carnegie, who erected the Carnegie Library here, Schwab visited the campus in 1903 and spoke at the double dedication of the buildings he and Carnegie had erected. Schwab's picture hangs on the left of the entrance to the auditorium facing that of Dr. Evan Pugh who served as first president of the College from 1850 to 1864.

Wallace Visions Football Faster With High Scorings

College football this fall will be faster than ever, with more touchdowns and more passing, according to Francis Wallace, noted sports authority, in his annual "pigskin preview" today in The Saturday Evening Post. "The accent for 1939 is on speed—more speed from opening to closing whistles, more plays per game, more scoring plays, fewer time-outs, less lagging all along the line," says Wallace. "Everything I've been able to gather from a ground crew composed of the best football coaches in the country adds up to this conclusion." Wallace reports that there is powerful sentiment in favor of rule changes to speed up the game and some suggestions would restrict time-outs, especially in the closing minutes of play and others would deal with unorthodox defense. "The great danger is that the trend to passing this season will be overdone," says Wallace. "Passing may be overdone, as razzle dazzle will go all the way out on to students in the School of Agriculture are.
