4 Rooms Opened In New Building

'Safety Valve' For Classroom Shortage Found in Electrical Engineering Building

Providing a much-needed "safety valve" for the critical classroom shortage, the opening of four rooms in the new electrical engineering building has been accomplished, Scheduling Officer Watkins announced yesterday.

Permission to use the new classrooms was granted by the General State Authority at the special request of the college administration. The electrical engineering building was used because G. S. A. officers and architects' offices are located there.

The rooms, 200, 201, 202, and 203 electrical engineering, are equipped with folding chairs and lapboards. Their combined seating capacity is 164 and they have already been filled for practically every hour, Watkins reported.

Although the new rooms will preclude the necessity of any students dropping courses, classrooms are still at a premium, Watkins stated. Math classes and English composition classes are still in rooms without blackboards, while some other courses have been transferred three or four times.

Girls physical education classes have been moved to the White Hall gymnasium, it has been announced. The classrooms where they were formerly held are now in use for other classes.

Appreciation of the cooperation received from faculty and student, during the class scheduling period was expressed by the scheduling officer.

1st Co-Ed Swim Slated Tonight

In conjunction with the College's taking over Glennland swimming pool, a co-ed swimming party, composed of the first 75 boys and first 75 girls who get there, will be held in the pool at 7 o'clock tonight. To be admitted to the party, girls need only their matriculation cards, boys a \$1 swim ticket, good for 16 swims, purchasable at the Bursar's office.

Entertainment for the initial Friday night party will consist of music by Student Union's "On the Discs" bands, card table games, and novelty races in the pool. Ray Conger, recreational supervisor, plans to keep Friday nights open at the pool for special parties such as the one tonight.

Under its new management, the College will now have complete control of the pool Monday through Friday from 9 p. m. to 6 p. m. and on Friday evenings until 10 p. m. Mornings will be used for required swimming, with the afternoons open to recreational swimming for all men students. Tickets allowing 16 swims will be sold for \$1.

New Campus Walks Will Help Crusade

Approximately three-fourths of a mile of new walks have been erected to help students comply with the request of President Hetzel to "keep off the grass." George W. Ebert, Superintendent of Grounds and Buildings announced yesterday.

The walks are part of a campaign to repair the damage done to the campus by the building program here. They extend from the Engineering Buildings to Pollock Road from Allen Mall to Burrows Street, and from the Agricultural Units to the Agricultural Science Building.
