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Tribunal Advocates Firm Stand Against 'Hell-Bent' Rioters

Judiciary Body Has Power To Expel Under New Student Constitution; Administration Indicates Support

Taking a firm stand behind the recent Collegian editorial, "Clamp Down—Now," Student Tribunal, highest judicial power of the new student government, set about its unrestricted task of dealing with "hell-bent agitators" who instigate students riots.

Tribunal was in turn backed by the Administration as President Ralph D Hetzel indicated his support at a special meeting of fraternity and independent unit presidents Monday night.

"Deal With Accordingly" "Students found guilty of destruction of property or instigating a disturbance detrimental to the name of the College will be dealt with accordingly," Student Tribunal claimed.

Tribunal's powers, under Article III, Section 6 of the Student Government Constitution may include such justifiable punishment and may recommend penalties up to and including expulsion from College.

While no definite action was taken at Monday's special meeting called by All-College President H. Clifton McWilliams, presidents of fraternities and units assumed responsibility for the actions of their respective houses.

Dr. Hetzel, and Dean of Men Arthur R. Warnock expressed desires that such riotous disturbances be avoided entirely, but insisted that in the event of such demonstrations the guilty individuals or parties should be subject to punishment.

Such a meeting Monday night was prompted by the uprising last Thursday night when an impromptu "pajama parade" caused damage estimated at \$100.

Tribunal Hits 10 Violators

Recognizes Philotes As Campus Organization

Student Tribunal unanimously voted to recognize Philotes as a campus society, slapped penalties on 10 belligerent freshmen, expelled 10 others, and clarified five points in the freshmen custom's code at its regular meeting Tuesday night.

According to a declaration of Tribunal, freshmen must wear customs throughout Dade's Day, week-ends as usual, except from 12 midnight Saturday until 8 a. m. Monday morning, despite the fact that they have parents visiting them.

Tribunal stated that the only time freshmen may be with girls is when the men are in the company of their parents. All freshmen must wear customs to the football games, no exempt. (Continued On Page Two)

The Soph Hop committee at a meeting Wednesday night decided the bands it would prefer, in descending order of preference, were Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, Glenn Gray, Hal Kemp, Hoace Hedt, Kay Kyser, Guy Lombardo, Jan Savitt, Sammy Kaye, Wayne King, Fletcher Henderson, and Richard Himber. At least half of these are likely to be acceptable to the Cabinet committee.

RETIREMENT FUND PROVIDES REQUIRED SUM

(Special To The Collegian) HARRISBURG, Oct. 5.—Building equipment contracts for structures at the Pennsylvania State College were approved by the General State Authority here late today, reliable sources claimed.

The sum allotted for the College was understood to be \$725,000, which is to be drawn from retirement and employes retirement funds.

That the contracts for portable equipment were approved was unconfirmed by F. X. Kerns, of the GSA office here.

This does not indicate that the contracts have not been approved, but that members of the Authority may have been instructed to withhold confirmation.

Thanksgiving Day Recess Sanctioned

Mid-Year Holiday May Now Be Added To College Calendar

The one-day Thanksgiving vacation on November 23 and a two-day mid-year holiday was officially sanctioned at the regular Senate meeting late yesterday.

A one day Thanksgiving vacation on Thursday, November 23, seemed assured today, following the approval of the all-College Cabinet at its meeting last Tuesday night.

The Cabinet approved the recommendation of the College Senate Calendar Committee, thus leaving the final decision up to the College Senate which met yesterday after the Collegian had gone to press.

There was little doubt that the College Senate would approve the action of its own Calendar Committee and that of the Cabinet.

The proposed plan calls for a one-day vacation on November 23, the date proclaimed by President Roosevelt. Soph Hop will fall on Friday night, and the Pitt game would be played Saturday afternoon.

In order to compensate for the one-day vacation, students would receive a two-day mid-semester vacation, starting on Thursday, February 1 at 11:50 a. m. and ending Monday, February 5 at 8 a. m. Exams would begin on Thursday, January 25 at 8 a. m., and second semester registration would start on February 5 at 8 a. m.

Nominations for dorm positions closed Monday. Additional nominations for women's dormitory posts, were made from the floor in house meetings Monday night after WSGA nominations were presented.

Edward K. Hibbsman, alumni secretary, presented the invitation to the Cabinet a week ago, with the hope that a joint meeting would aid in fostering better student-alumni relationships. Hibbsman also invited the Cabinet to attend a dinner at the Nittany Lion Inn on October 13 as guests of the Association, which the Cabinet also accepted.

All are veterans except Gabinski, who is a rugged sophomore sensation.

The array which will probably open for Coach Al Humphrey's team will find Harry Wemmer and Willard Gore at ends, Frank Poulos and Harry Stasky at tackles, John Plewak and Joe Grieco at opening night for "Squaring the Circle," one of the scariest productions that has been presented on any stage.
