"Deal With Accordingly"

"Students found guilty of destruction of property or instigat-ing a disturbance detrimental to the name of the College will be dealt with accordingly,' Student Tribunal claimed

Tribunal's powers, under Article III, Section 6 of the Student Government Constitution may include such justifiable punishment and may recommend penalties up to and including expulsion from College.
