Following upon this each becomes enamored of the other's mate and none is willing to come out with it. All the possibilities of this situation are explored by the author and the time is ripe for the district organizer to appear.

He upsets the calculations of Rabinovitch, seeing nothing in a canary and a set of curtains which is contrary to the revolution, nor does he see anything in kissing which is contrary thereto. He solves all the problems by dialectic—albeit that of Neusbaum rather than that of Marx.

The acting throughout the play was good. To qualify this statement by saying that it does not meet Broadway standards is both useless and meaningless where a review calls for encouragement based upon demonstrated ability. All the principal characters did well and, if special mention is needed, let it go to Rumbaugh, Miss Davies, Miss Sitasel, Yanofsky, Davidson, Weinstein and Doroshov.

A few criticisms are offered, however. There was too great a tendency to talk through the laughs, which sometimes spoiled a good line of action. Also, power in delivering a word is no substitute for emphasis.

The Association budget for the fiscal year ended June 30 shows three major items of income in the total of \$12,050.55. From the College, \$4,000, students and faculty, \$1,688.87, and alumni and friends, \$6,362.76.

Other receipts were State College funds, \$127.85, endowment fund income, \$260.44, cabin fees, \$89.60, mimeographing fees, \$20.12, and miscellaneous income, \$6.91.

The largest item of expense was for the regular program activities, \$8,180.51. Major item under this section was \$6,500 for three program secretaries.

Other items of expense were \$233 to national and world service organizations, \$3,023.08 for general expenses including a \$2,317.05 item for office personnel, a capital outlay for septic tanks of \$63.96, and \$550 for debt service. Total expenses were \$12,050.55.
