Novelty
Provided the Nittanymen ride to a toughshod victory over Army at West Point tomorrow, they will go into the Pitt game with only one deep scar and a tiny scratch on their 1939 escutcheon—a somewhat novel achievement for them considering that the last season they lost less than three games was in 1927.

State Ready
And so it's a deliciously happy gang of gridder, fired by an up set victory over Penn, that will storm the Army's stronghold on the Hudson tomorrow afternoon prepared to check the buffeting attack a stubborn Cadet team is expected to offer.

Of State's eight opponents, none have sent as many scouts to analyze the Lions as has Army. There have been between three and five Army scouts at every Penn State game this year. 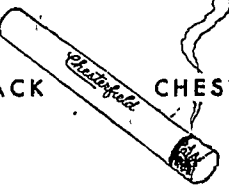
