Owls Deadlock Booters; Is 53rd Game In Streak

Wodock Outstanding At Goal For State; Megrail And Hosterman Good On Offense

Still undefeated after a grueling scoreless tie with Temple Saturday afternoon in the City of Brotherly Love, Penn State's soccer Lions finished their season with strong hopes of again being named national champions.

The tie was only the fifth stalemate during the long victory streak and marked the 53rd game without defeat for the Jeffrey-coached lads in seven undefeated seasons. During this season the Lions had won seven straight games before the defensive Owls halted them. It was the first tie since the Army game two years ago.

Facing a strong defensive outfit in the Owls, the Nittany eleven failed to ripple the nets despite the fact that they possessed the ball for the greater part of the game. On numerous occasions, however, Owl goalie Dunn was forced to write as he kept the Temple goal line unscathed.

Bottle Up Bigott
It was a different style of play that the Lions faced in the Temple team's tactics. The Owls stressed a tight defense especially around the goal where they placed additional stalwarts. Another item which may have accounted for the failure of the State booters to tally was the close watch Temple kept over All-American Gus Bigott.

Gus was constantly guarded by at least two Temple players throughout the fray and was held scoreless for the first time this season. He previously had tallied in every game since he returned to the lineup in the Lehigh game.

An off-side decision by the referee regarding Bill Bathgate of Temple saved the Lions from their first defeat. Bathgate had knocked the ball over the line after a scrimmage with Lion goalie Hovey Wodock.

Wodock, who was at goal in its last game instead of Zen Laskaras, played a brilliant game throughout. Three saves, one of them by flipping the ball over the top of the goal, highlighted his defensive prowess.

Since most of the playing was done between the middle of the field and the 20-yard markers, it was only natural that halfbacks Don Megrail and Walt Hosterman were outstanding on offense.

More important than the victory was the sensational way Soose accomplished it. Fresh from a five round knockout scored over Jackie Munley in Scranton three weeks earlier, Soose stretched Duca on the canvas for a nine-count in the sixth and won every round but the second.

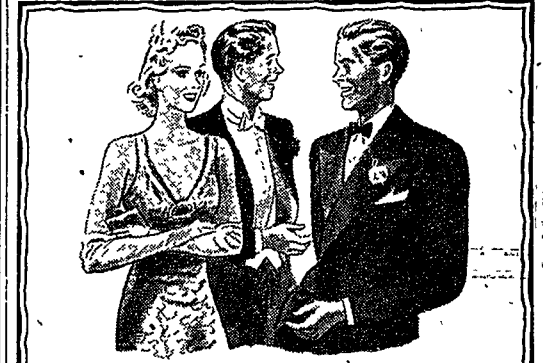

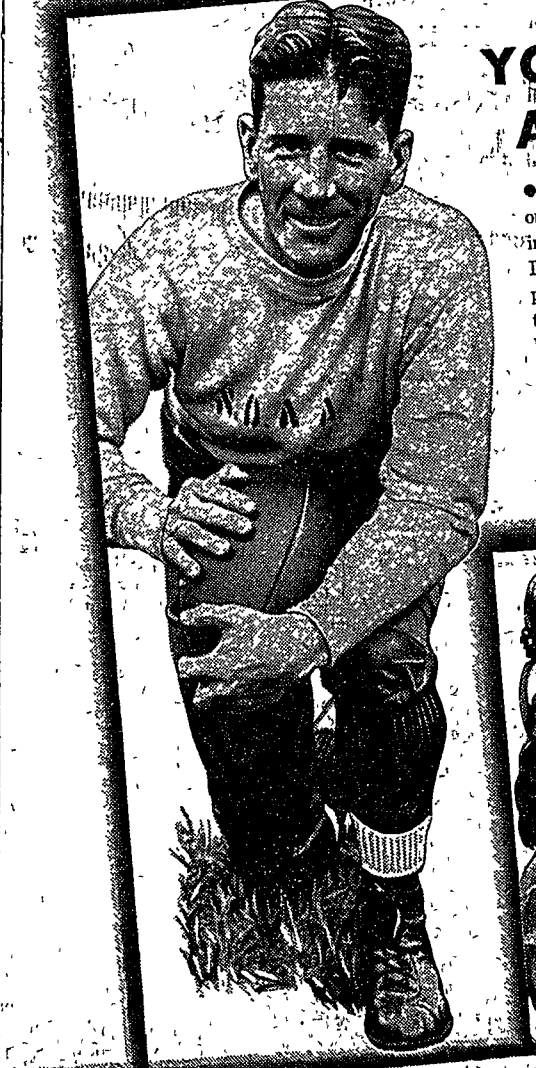
