Steve Rollins, with an injured hip, has shown considerable improvement during the week, but will probably be replaced at tailback by vastly improved Chuck Peters. Bill Smaltz because of his fractured wrist but may see action with the injured arm in a cast.

In the line, Nemeth, at guard will be hampered by a broken nose and injured shoulder. Mike Gradinski may get the call over the senior regular. At the tackles another problem is confronting the Lion mentors Stravinski and Frank Platt have been both bothered with minor hurts, and one of them may move out for Walt Kniaz who played a bang up game at Army. The ends will be as usual, Captain Alters and Tim Vargo, center will be Leon "All-American" Gajecki. Craig White and Johnny Patrick will start in the other two backfield spots.

Leading Panther threat will be dashing "Dandy Dick" Cassiano, faithful leftover from Pitt's "Dream Backfield." Cassiano was the leading Panther ground gainer and scorer last season even in company with Messrs Marshall Goldberg and Curly Stebbins.

Edgar "Special Delivery" Jones will be another Panther to keep eyes on. Witnesses of last year's freshman game with Pitt will remember the feats of the sophomore flash who can do almost anything with a football except eat it.

Along the line, Pitt boasts its usual power, though the loss of Dick Fullerton in the Fordham clash has caused some consternation in the Panther den. Johnny Dickinson and Joe Rettinger are a fine pair of ends and Frank Kristufek and Harold Klein in the center of the line are defensive bulwarks.
