# Boxers Tie Army; Wrestlers Win Two

## Lion Matmen Deadlock Army, 4-4, As Stanko Garner's TKO Over Ryan; Cadets Take 2 Final Bout's To Tie

### Baird, Stanko, Sandson, Lewis Top Opponents; Cooper Loses To Lavendusky In 5th Encounter

Having fought a well-nigh invincible Army team to a bitter 4-4 deadlock, Penn State's boxing Lions are ready for the two-week vacation from ring warfare they get before encountering four tough opponents—Virginia, Michigan State, Syracuse and Cornell—all within the short space of two weeks.

Prior to their tie with Army's intercollegiate champions, the Nittanymen handed an over-advertised Toronto team a sound 6-2 lacing to remain undefeated for the season.

Against the Cadets, the Lions swept all of the middleweight bouts to gain a deadlock.

### Impressions

That John Lawther's sliding-line basketball defense must rank second only to the Maginot Line in impenetrability if his team's defensive record means anything. In 12 games the Nittanymen have held their opponents to the paltry average of 25 points per game. Going into the tough half of their 23-game schedule, the Lions have a 35-point offensive average to maintain.

That regardless of score, the State-Princeton wrestling meet Saturday night was probably the best dual battle State fans have seen within the last four years. Fiercely fought and bitterly drawn right from the beginning, the meet was one of those now-you-have-it-now-you-don't affairs that left you gasping for breath after every match.

That Penn State's boxing deadlock with Army, intercollegiate champions, is a pretty fair indication of how things may go in the EIBA championships here this year. But then there's always Syracuse to worry about.

### Reflections

That Norwood Henry "Barney" Ewell will someday win the coveted title "Fastest Human." That's not a prediction, but it stands to reason that after his splendid showing against the nation's fastest men in the Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden it could very easily happen.

That if their score against the Navy plebes is any indication of the strength of Penn State's freshman gym team, Gene Wettstone's 1941 varsity should be a world-beater. The frosh trounced the plebes, 42-12, while their upper-class brethren lost to the Navy varsity, 41-13.

### Athlete Of The Week

### Observations

Don't be surprised if preliminary bouts featuring town youngsters are put on for the benefit of early comers at all of the remaining home boxing meets, the intercollegiate included.

The new boxing glove designed by Lion mentor Leo Houck was used for the first time by the Nittany matmen against Toronto. The new Houck mitten features two radical changes for future ring leatherwear: (1) More padding on the knuckles where it is needed most, and (2) A much wider finger grip that eliminates any possibility of the fist being cramped.

## Lion Matmen Smash Syracuse, 22-6, Princeton, 26-6; Frank Gleason Drops Tiger Captain For Season's 3rd Fall

### Rohrer, Gleason Only Grapplers To Pin Orange Opponents; Bortz And Hess Toss Nassau Foes

Penn State's "Spartans of Spindel" climbed two notches higher on the Eastern Intercollegiate championship ladder during the last two weeks with crushing mat triumphs over Syracuse and Princeton, both victories taking place on the Rec Hall canvas.

In trouncing Syracuse 22-6 in Rec Hall last Saturday, the Lion matmen registered two falls and gained four decisions to chalk up their third consecutive win.

One week later the crusading Blue and White grapplers overwhelmed Princeton's previously unbeaten wrestlers 26-6 to record "victory No. 4," with Frank Gleason, Lion 136-pounder, featuring the Saturday night rout by scoring a fall over Captain Dick Harding, Tiger intercollegiate champion in 1937 and 1938.

Against the Orange, Gleason and Chuck Rohrer won by falls. Utilizing cave-man tactics, with a little hair-pulling and face-slapping tossed in, Clarence Patten, Syracuse 136-pounder, annoyed Gleason until the Lion star threw Clarence with a punishing figure four scissor and half nelson in 7:58.

In the 165-pound affair, Rohrer was unable to accomplish a take-down in the first three minutes of his bout with Walt Roslund, and the match went into two periods of three minutes each. The Lion senior thoroughly proved his mastery by gaining falls in both sessions. The first came after Rohrer completed a reverse in 1:25 and the second occurred in 1:09 of the second period.

Clair Hess, Lion sophomore, scored his first fall in varsity competition when he threw Van Brewer of Princeton with a bar arm and half-nelson in 8:42.

Captain Ernie Bortz tallied the fourth fall against the Old Nassau grapplers when he threw Don Patterson, Tiger light-heavy with a bar arm and body press in 7:20.
