Lion Cagers Beat Tech 48-26 In Season Finale

They looked sad in December—but it was one of the most efficient, supercharged machines in Nittany cage history which ran roughshod over Carnegie Tech's Tartans, 48-26, to wind up the season with a magnificent marksmanship display in Rec Hall Monday night.

A smashing revenge for the early-season Plaid setback was achieved as the locals jumped to an early 8-2 lead, marked time for a few minutes, and turned on the pressure to spurt to a 20-point margin early in the second half.

Tech's defense was completely unable to stop the Lion charge, while the Lawther zone held high-scoring Rube Stark, Tartan ace, to a mere 9 points. It was the 15th victory in 23 Lion starts.

Among those present were Red-tatched Scotty Moffatt, tossing in 15 points to pace the scoring in his top performance of the year.

Superman Johnny Barr, running his season total to 231 for a new Penn State individual record. Captain Cliff McWilliams, winding up his collegiate career in top-notch fashion.

Sophomore Elmer Gross, displaying vast improvement since December 2.

And Noim Racusin, showing plenty of dead-eye work near the Tech hoop.

Coach "Doc" Krutner has not announced the lineup. "Only probable change from last meet's setup is in the sabres, with Les Kutz a prospective dueler with that weapon."

Houckmen Close Season Against National Champs

Bernie Sandson, 155 pound senior boxing star, announced the termination of his ring career yesterday. Homer Hoffman will replace him in the lineup against Wisconsin.

Penn State's Eastern Intercollegiate boxing champions meet a rival at Madison, Wis., tomorrow when they close their dual meet season against Wisconsin's 1939 national champions.

Three individual national champions and one national runner-up last year will be in the lineup the Nittany Lions must face before a 15,000 crowd in Wisconsin's vast field house tomorrow night.

Heavyweight Spike Alter and George Hankins, 120 pounder, will drop from the Penn State lineup that won the Eastern title last weekend and be replaced by Paul Mall and Vic Fiore respectively. Alter needs the time to prepare for Army Air Corps examinations, while Hankins is behind in his regular class work.

National champions in the Wisconsin lineup are Gene Rankin, 135, Omar (The Assassin) Crocker, 145, and Woody Swancutt, 155. Nick Lee, runner-up for the national heavyweight crown last year, will battle at 175.
