Ten Finalists Suggested By Coed Groups Will Be Presented To Bandleader

A Junior Prom Queen, personally selected by Bandleader Glenn Miller, will reign over the annual prom in Rec Hall May 3. Co-chairmen Paul J. Scally '41 and Peter G. Felko '41 announced yesterday.

Photos of 10 coeds picked as finalists will be presented to the bandleader for his choice. The 10 beauties will be selected by the Junior Prom Committee from among those recommended by various women's groups on the campus.

It will be the first time in some years that a queen has been selected for the Prom. She will be presented during intermission.

Members of the committee who will select the finalists are, in addition to Scally and Felko: Bette L. Campbell, Shirley E. Hebel, Keimit J. Christman, John E. Gallagher, Stanley L. Marcus, Wade E. Mott, Samuel Schwartz, and Henry J. Eavis Jr., all juniors.

Layman's Idea Of Miller Is 'Overnight Success'; Few Know Of Planning

An "overnight success"—that, to the average swing fan, is the story of Glenn Miller, whose sensational "Moonlight Serenade" orchestra will make its first visit to Penn State for Junior Prom May 3.

Despite his phenomenal, record-setting rise to fame since he took up the baton, however, Glenn is not a new figure in the musical world. For many years he's been a "behind-the-scenes" celebrity, a "musician's musician," known as one of the outstanding trombone virtuosi and one of the greatest arrangers in the business. He helped to organize and set the styles for such bands as Jimmy Dorsey and Ray Noble.

Thought Long of Band
His band, comparatively new in actuality, has existed in the mind of the lank, bespectacled young man for a long time. During the many years while he was playing and arranging for other top-notchers, Glenn kept planning his "dream band," for which he tucked away choice ideas and revolutionary arrangements. When all was ready, Glenn organized his band with top-notch musicians and shot straight to fame.

Bob Strong, young bandleader, summed up the feeling of the profession when he said recently, "Glenn is not only a great musician and arranger, but one of the grandest fellows in the business. I'm sure I admire Miller above all the others in the field today."

compensation report, the following explanation was added as an amendment to the proposed plan:

"In three major offices, All-College President, Vice-President and Senior Class President, a fixed compensation is set up as a direct charge against class fund. For the Senior Ball chairman there is a fixed compensation of \$50 as a charge against the dance income. In the Junior Prom and Sophomore Hop there are compensations of \$50 each for the chairman and class presidents, this being the only compensation received by the Junior and Sophomore class presidents. For various committees, fixed compensations are granted to committee members as a charge against the income of these activities. In all cases the rate of compensation bears a direct relation to two factors: The actual work in terms of hours involved, and the administration of a financial trust."

Graft Eliminated
"Under this plan of fixed compensations all profits from dances and other activities go into class funds. In short, the 40 or more students involved in the system receive no other types of income from these activities. Therefore, various types of graft and commissions cannot exist."

The above plan with amendment was explained to the Cabinet by Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, and after considerable discussion was approved by a 14-6 ballot. Six cabinet members opposed the plan: Charles E. Thompson '40, Samuel G. Gallu '40, Donald A. Lerch '40, Wallace A. Dunlap '40, Sarabell Shirm '40, and May H. O'Connell '40.

President H. Clifton McWilliams appointed Dunlap and Gallu to work with the student loan committee in engaging a prominent opera star to come to this campus to aid in securing additional money for the fund.

President McWilliams also announced a committee to plan for the All-College inauguration ceremonies, headed by Clarence H. Evans '40, Sarabell Shirm '40, Quentin C. Couch '40, Richard C. Peters '41, and Louis Corbin '41.

Carl W. Ernst, Jr. '40 was elected president of Scarab, professional architectural fraternity, after six students were initiated at the Delta Upsilon house recently.

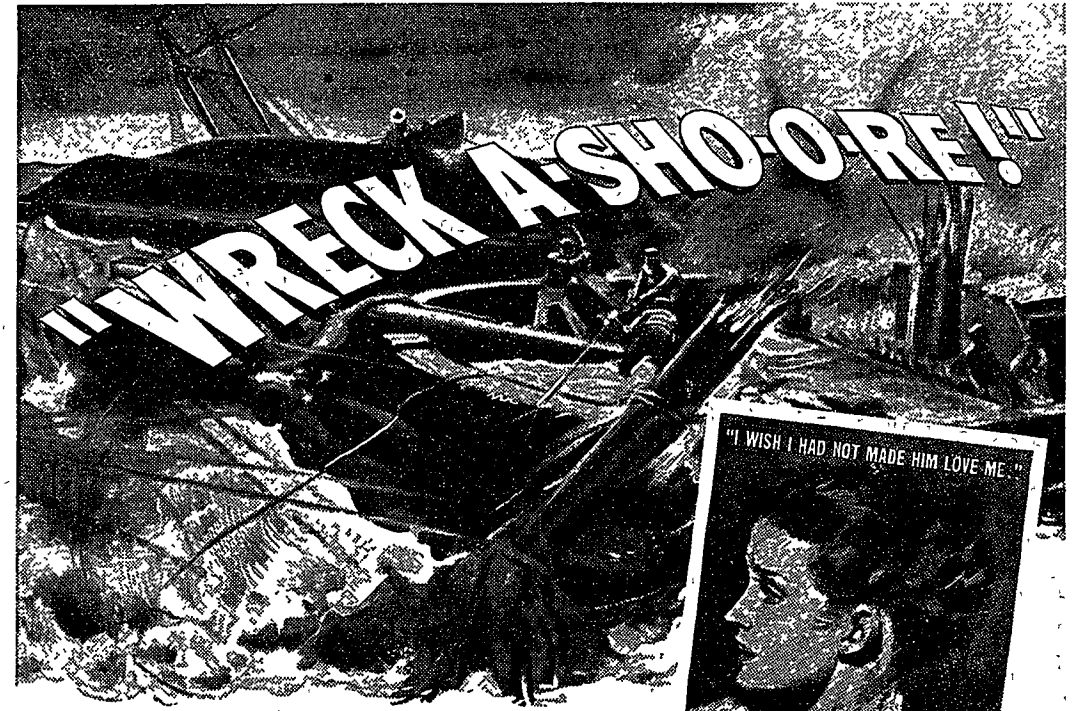
