## Leffler Completes Industrial Survey

### State-Wide Production Shows Definite Slump

Dr. George L. Leffler, assistant professor of economics and assistant director of Penn State's monthly Business Survey, recently completed a \$200 Grant-In-Aid Survey which revealed that Pennsylvania industries have shrunk in manufacturing output since 1914.

Because the center of population has been moving west, Dr. Leffler explained, Pennsylvania's share of the national total of manufactured products has dropped from 11.9 per cent in 1914 to 9.9 in 1937.

20 Industries Decrease  
Out of 29 leading manufacturing groups in Pennsylvania, only nine have definitely increased or increased their share of the national output during the last 20 years, Dr. Leffler pointed out.

The industries holding their own are canning and preserving, cigars, cocoa products, knit goods and hosiery, and petroleum refining, while the most notable decline took part in the heavy industries such as iron and steel.
