

All-College Cabinet Overruled By McWilliams

President Will Not Approve 1940-41 Activities Budgets; Says 'No Funds'

Only Other Changes Were Reduction In Numeral Award Fund And Freshman Dance Appropriations

Using his power to overrule an all-College Cabinet decision for the first time during his year's term, H Clifton McWilliams Jr '40, all-College president, announced yesterday that he will not approve activities budgets for 1940-41 passed by the Cabinet at its meeting Tuesday night.

The reason given by McWilliams was that funds are not available for budget appropriations of \$75 to each of the seven school councils.

The appropriations were not included in the budget as submitted by the Interclass Finance Board but were added by an amendment from the floor.

When the amendment was proposed Bernard A Newman '40, chairman of Interclass Finance Board, stated that the estimated income of \$21,240 would leave an approximate \$700 balance after budgeted expenditures are deducted.

However McWilliams said yesterday that investigation has shown that this is not true, that the actual expenditures will fall within a few dollars of the estimated receipts.

Appropriations impossible. If the student council appropriations are to be included in the budget under expected financial conditions the entire budget will have to be revised and deductions made from allotments for other activities. Otherwise, the only possibility of including the appropriations is for next year's income to be higher than the estimated figure.

If the Interclass Finance Board fails to revise the budget, McWilliams stated that he will veto the measure. A two-thirds vote of Cabinet members is necessary to pass a bill over the veto of the president.

Besides the school council appropriations only changes from this year's budget were a reduction in the numeral award appropriation from \$1,400 to \$1,025 and a reduction in the Freshman Dance allotment from \$150 to \$100.

Addition to Comp List. The town counselor was added to the comp list and class presidents and dance chairmen were limited to one complimentary ticket each. Paul J Scally '41 and Peter G Fetzko '41, Junior Prom co-chairmen, were each voted \$25 as compensation, the same amount received by the chairmen of other big dances this year.

Blue Band Trips. The Blue Band will make two trips with the football team next fall. On October 23 the band will go to Philadelphia for the Temple game and on November 26 it will visit Pittsburgh for the Pitt game. Cabinet voiced disapproval of student conduct in the women's dormitory 'lounges' and voted to send statements to the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women "encouraging any action which might be taken to cope with such misconduct."

The Board of Trustees will be sent a statement to the effect that it may call on the all-College president to act in an advisory capacity on student problems.
