All-College Inauguration Scheduled 4 P.M. Today

Parade Opens Ceremonies; Dr. Hetzel Will Speak; Elliot '40 Will Administer Oath Of Office To Laich

Arnold C. Laich '41 will officially take office as the second all-college president at inauguration ceremonies scheduled for the main campus gate following the parade which begins at 4 p.m. today.

Dr. Ralph D. Hetzel, president of the College, will be the featured speaker at the ceremonies. The Blue Band and the Pershing Rifles are slated to participate in the parade.

The oath of office will be administered by G. Warren Elliott '40, chairman of Student Tribunal.

The parade will start from the rear of Old Main, proceed to Shortridge Road, to East College Avenue, and then to the main gate.

Even though formally inaugurated, Laich will not actually be a member of all-college Cabinet until he is installed at tonight's meeting. H. Clifton McWilliams Jr. '40 will still head the group during the installation of the new members, the last act of the retiring Cabinet.

Before the installation the Cabinet will hear a new budget report by the Interclass Finance Board.

McWilliams indicated yesterday that he will veto the proposed budget if appropriations for the seven school councils can't be included but expressed the belief that reappointment of expenditures will permit the inclusion of the necessary \$525.

If he does veto the budget it may still go into effect if passed

Bulltrick Named To Talk At June 9 Baccalaureate

Service Honoring Class Of 1890 Features 4-Day Commencement Program

Dr. George A. Bulltrick, of the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City, will deliver the principal baccalaureate address in Recreation Hall at 11 a.m. on Baccalaureate Day, Sunday, June 9. The subject of the address has not been announced as yet.

The baccalaureate service, dedicated to the Class of 1890 which will celebrate its 50th anniversary, will be one of the highlights of the four-day commencement program beginning at 12 noon, Friday, June 7, and lasting till 10:30 a.m. Monday, June 10.

Other important traditional events on the program are the Senior Class Day exercises and Blue Band concert on the front campus at 6 p.m. Sunday, June 9, commencement procession at 10 a.m. and commencement exercises on New Beaver Field at 10:30 a.m. Monday, June 10. In case of rain, the exercises will be held in Recreation Hall, admission by ticket only.

"What a Life," a comedy presented by the Penn State Players, and houseparty dances will start the weekend activities on Friday evening, June 7. Both will be repeated Saturday.

The feature of Alumni Day, June 8, will be reunions held by all fifth year classes from the Class of 1885 on. Other highlights in the alumni activities will be a golf tournament, a bus tour of the campus, luncheon in Recreation Hall, a baseball game with the University of Pittsburgh, and class dinners for both reunion and non-reunion classes. Dean of Women Charlotte E. Ray, assisted by members of her staff, hostesses of the dormitories, and the State College Alumnae Club will entertain alumnae in Frances Atherton Hall.

Alice Drops Glass Eyes On Bull's Eye; Officials Shortsighted, Lions Lose

The Penn State Armen are going to have to admit that a woman did something they couldn't do when they held their banquet in the Sandwich Shop at 6:30 p.m. Saturday.

Graduate student Alice Shuttles took first place in the "most unscheduled event" at the annual intercollegiate Flying Club competition in Philadelphia on May 4, while the Armen could do no better than second among eight schools in the regular competition.

Miss Shuttles' triumph came in the bomb-dropping event where she accidentally dropped her glasses while aiming a flour sack at a bomb target from an airplane 400 feet in the air traveling 90 miles an hour.

When the competition was over not a flour sack had hit the target but Miss Shuttles' glasses lay squarely on the target, unbroken and unburnt.

Appearing with Miss Riedy will be Vernon L. Hull '38, and a violinist.

Blind Pianist Coming

Like Miss Riedy, Hull is blind. He will play several solo selections on the piano.

The name of the violinist has not been announced but he is a fellow student of Miss Riedy's at the Eastman School of Music at Rochester, N. Y.

Miss Riedy is a graduate of the school and for four years held the Eastman Honorary Fellowship, one of the highest musical awards in the country. She plans to return to Rochester this fall for advanced voice study under the tutelage of Dr. Thomas Austin-Ball.

Racusin, Gleason Remain In Race For Secretary

Hockey And Skiing Adopted As Varsity Sports In Light Vote

Jack A. Brand '41 and Walter E. Hosterman '41 will vie for the Athletic Association presidency and Frank A. Gleason '41 and Norman Racusin '41 for the secretary-treasurerhip today in run-off elections resulting from failure of any candidate to secure a majority in the light voting yesterday.

Ice hockey and skiing were made official intercollegiate sports by overwhelming majorities at the A. A. elections. Varsity members of the two teams will receive six-inch letter awards in the future and this year's senior varsity members of the former informal sports will receive the six-inch award.

Voting today on the four remaining candidates will take place in the first floor lobby of Old Main from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. All men voting must present properly signed A. A. books.

Voting this year was over 170 votes lighter than last year with only 819 men casting ballots yesterday. None of the candidates had the necessary 410 votes to carry the election.

William C. Kirkpatrick '41 and Van A. Harlman '41 were dropped from today's ballot.

 4. Only if England and France appear to be losing 10%
 5. U. S. should join now 2%
 6. Other conditions 5%
 7. No opinion 4%

(Six months ago 36 per cent of the students favored fighting if Britain and France were losing, now only 10 per cent.)

Trustees Create New Bacteriology Department; Lingerer New Ag Vice-Dean

To Finish Organization, Name Dean By July 1st

The creation of a department of bacteriology in the School of Agriculture was the main item of business at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees Friday night.

Organization of the new department and selection of a head will be completed by July 1 when the action of the committee goes into effect. Bacteriology is now a division of the department of dairy husbandry.

Other business included the granting of leaves of absence to Kalman J. DeJuhaz, professor of engineering research, first semester of 1940-41, Kingsley Davis, associate professor of sociology, 1940-41, and Harrison M. Tietz, associate professor of zoology, first semester of 1940-41.

The committee accepted the resignation of Miss N. Maude Vedder, associate professor of home economics.

Appointments Made

Fred F. Lingerer, head of the department of agricultural economics, was appointed vice-dean

of the School of Agriculture and vice-director of the agriculture experiment station. Adam L. Beam, director of the two-year curriculum in agriculture, was selected as director of agriculture short courses.

Logan J. Bennett, leader of the Pennsylvania cooperative wild life research unit, was elevated to the position of wild life management. James A. Hanley was named college auditor to succeed W. N. Tanner who resigned in 1938.

The scholarship of Shuk Yee Chan, Lingnan University exchange student, was continued for 1940-41.
