Lion Netmen To Meet Cornell Tomorrow Away

Lions Down Crusaders, 9-0, Friday, For Fourth Victory Of 1940 Season

Penn State's tennis team meets Cornell's outstanding netmen at Ithaca, N. Y., tomorrow, fresh from its 9-0 rout of Susquehanna Friday for its fourth victory of the season.

An indication of the Big Red Courtmen's power may be gathered from the fact that they defeated Navy 5-4. The latter in turn were victorious over Coach Ted Roethke's minions, 8-1.

In making a clean sweep of all nine matches against the Crusaders, the Lions found easy sailing in all but one match. One doubles match was forced to three sets. Coach Roethke used two substitute doubles combinations but Susquehanna failed to stem the Nittany tide.

Mac Weinstein and Johnny Knode both enjoyed field days in sweeping their opponents of the court without the loss of a single game.

Maule Wins Mile Race, Deadlocks With Smith In 2-Mile Run; Vukmanic Victor In Spear Toss

The stellar performance of Barney Ewell was not enough to offset a well-balanced Pitt track squad when the Panthers defeated the Lions, 79-61, in a dual meet in the Smoky City Saturday.

Ewell continued his record breaking streak by smashing the Pitt stadium record in the 220-yard dash, setting a new mark of 21.5 seconds.

Besides breaking the 220 record, Barney won two other events, the 100-yard dash and the broad jump. His time in the 100 was 9.9 seconds and he captured the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet, one inch.

Frank Maule also won honors by capturing both the mile and the two mile events, tying with Bill Smith for first place in the latter. The time in the mile was 4:28.2 and in the two mile, 9:51.2.

Captain Nick Vukmanic also led the Nittany men by winning the javelin throw with a toss of 203 feet, and winning a second in the shotput and a third in the discus.

Dick Peters Lost We Forget

Penn State had a good football season last fall. The Lion soccer team went through its state undefeated. Joe Bedenk's baseballers are having a very successful season. Which is all very well and good.

But as much overlooked as a discarded banana peel is Penn State's leading athletic team of the year, if records are to be a basis for selection. Inside the musty Armory walls, Penn State's varsity rifle team has compiled an enviable list of accomplishments.

In postal matches, the Lion gunners dropped only one of 30, and came through undefeated in two shoulder-to-shoulder matches. In plain and simple figures, the rifers' record book has an entry somewhat to this effect: Debit—1 match, Credit—31 matches.

No other team in the College can boast a record like that one, when one considers that the Lion trigger-pullers competed with schools all over the United States and even in Hawaii. But that's not the entire story.

In the National Rifle Association National Intercollegiate, in which 45 colleges took part, the Nittany shooters came off with second honors and the Eastern championship. The University of Iowa team, which won the competition, broke the meet record by 12 points, only after the Lions had cracked the mark by four.

The Lions also grabbed a third place in the Third Corps Area Intercollegiate Championships, which only adds to the right honorable success story they have written this year.

Navy's Midshipmen have already challenged the Lion marksmen to a shoulder-to-shoulder, eye-to-eye match next February 22. With the Nittany brigade losing only one man from their present squad, we'd say that the Sailors are looking a long way ahead for a good lead-taking.

Freshman Nine Trounces Cornell Yearlings, 12-4; Smith Hurls Entire Game

Coming back with a 15-hit batting spree after two successive defeats at the hands of Mercersburg Academy and Syracuse, the Lion freshman nine trounced Cornell, 12-4, here Saturday.

Ed Smith, right-handed pitcher, was the first cub hurler to go the full route, allowing seven scattered hits, striking out seven Bear batsmen, and yielding only four free passes.

The Nittany frosh started off with a single tally in the third inning, added three more in the fourth, one in the fifth, and then routed the Bears with six runs in the seventh with the 12th run coming in the eighth.

Lion Gymnasts Take Second In AAU Meet As Pico Wins Third Crown

Coming off with a sure second place in team scoring and a title-holder and runner-up in the rope climb, Penn State's gymnasts awaited today a ruling which might give them the first place team title in the National AAU gymnastics meet held in Chicago last Friday and Saturday.

Roman Pico, ace Lion rope-climber, took his third National AAU rope-climb title within five years, having held the same crown in 1935 and 1937. Chuck Gillespie surprised with a second place in the same event.

The University of Illinois took the team title with 17 points but were facing loss of the team crown to the Lions on a possible ruling by the AAU on the sanction of some of its athletes.

Other Lion gymnasts, Lou Bordo and John Wolf, made creditable showings against stiff competition. Bordo took a seventh place in the parallel bar, while Wolf, taking a sixth in the horizontal bar, was only one point out of third position.

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Cutting the Smoky City fog with his fast ball and sharp breaking midrop, southpaw Jim Richardson turned in a four-hit, 12-inning pitching performance in cutting a weak, erratic Pitt Panther, 6-4, at Pittsburgh Saturday.

In a second-inning, live-inning rally, singles by Bud Sherwin, Bill Debler, and Mattin Valeri, a sacrifice by Peany Gates, a pass to Ken Tuinn, Kish's wild pitch and his hitting Fritz Seibel, set the stage for Richardson's double into the short right field stands and furnished a lead for the Lions.

Richardson was troubled by the Panthers only twice, once when Peany Gates dropped Jones' fly in the first inning prior to Fife's two-run scoring triple, and again in the ninth when four successive walks scored the last Pitt run as Ed Bastian relieved Richardson, and forced pinch-hitter Drobnewski to pop up for the final out.

Besides his two base blow, Richardson whacked out a long triple down the left field line to share hitting honors with Bud Sherwin, who banged two singles and stole two bases against the Panthers.
