

Exhibition Of 'Leading American Watercolorists' Opens Tomorrow In Main Engineering Art Gallery

Division of Fine Arts Announces 3rd Annual Summer Program; Forum Discussions Stated

Opening its third annual Summer Session program of art gallery exhibitions and discussions, the division of fine arts of the department of architecture will present an exhibition of "Leading American Watercolorists," in the College Art Gallery, room 303, Main Engineering building, starting tomorrow and continuing until July 27.

Rather than having several minor exhibitions, it has been decided to schedule this one important show during the first several weeks of Summer Session. The exhibition will be sponsored by the American Federation of Arts American artists, it is said by more than one authority, have contributed more to the development of the watercolor medium than to any other except architecture. This is extravagant praise, but there is no doubt that the watercolor is particularly well suited to the traditional American temperament, with the opportunity it affords for the display of vigor, spontaneity, and verve.

The present exhibition, according to J. Burne Helme, head of the division of fine arts, makes no claim to comprehensiveness. Its aim is to present contemporary handling of the medium by the younger artists who have achieved eminence.

Homer Was Pioneer Winslow Homer, who has been termed the most "thoroughly American" painter, is the direct ancestor of an important and perhaps most engaging branch of the contemporary school of watercolorists, who employ rich washes of aqua in a bold and vigorous manner. For a while, these painters seemed to have completely outmoded the use of body color, or gouache, which was the favorite medium a generation ago and earlier.

But today a considerable group of painters, as may be seen in the present exhibition, has revived this method. The Government's art projects gave great impetus to watercolor painting and many contemporary watercolorists use tempera, pen and ink, drawing, pencil, crayon and anything else that will assist them in producing the effects they have in mind.

Teaching Traditions It would be interesting to attempt to trace traditions, such as the Homer-Sargent bravura, in the work of present-day painters represented in the current exhibition, by naming those who seem to be exemplifying the earlier masters' reputations for well-organized subject matter, broad and sure handling, a sense of spaciousness and freshness of color. But some of the freshest colors and the most striking depictions of distance and space are to be found among the work in gouache. Contemporary watercolorists defy classification just as did Homer in his day. It will be seen from this traveling exhibition, that American watercolorists are thinking and experimenting along many lines, with varying degrees

Fly Control Should Begin At The Home, Entomologist Says

Fly control, like charity, should begin at home, according to a College entomologist. "If a fly crawls on your bald head or keeps the baby awake, it probably is a home-grown specimen in search of food or a place to lay its eggs," explains H. E. Hodgkiss, College extension entomologist. Hodgkiss recommends pyrethrum powder or various oil-pyrethrum sprays as fly killers "because they are not injurious to humans and can be used effectively about the kitchen and other rooms at night."

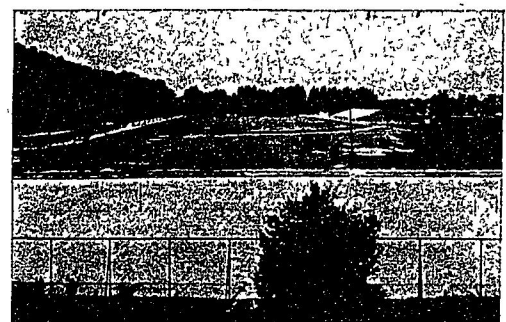

Shorthand Just For Girls? Not At All, Asserts Kenworthy

Shorthand isn't just for girls, according to Wilmer E. Kenworthy, executive secretary of the Pennsylvania State College, who declares "the opportunity for men secretaries today is greater than ever." Kenworthy pointed out that many executives and famous men had used shorthand or typing to get jobs which proved to be stepping stones to later careers, including Samuel Insull, Edward Bok, Governor Harry Moore of New Jersey, Herbert Hoover, and Billy Rose. "Help-wanted columns are filled with advertisements for male stenographers," he continued. "Employment agencies have more calls for young men secretaries than they can fill. The college graduate equipped with stenography has an added advantage in gaining an opportunity which otherwise might be denied him."

Court reporting is another field open to the man who is expert in shorthand, Kenworthy added, and many statesmen also use men stenographers. "Not only are these jobs interesting," he said, "but they are the most stable and dependable in the business world. In addition, they are very often an entering wedge to executive positions. There is no better place to learn the business than next to the chief's desk."
