# Bourgerie Is Named Cross-Country Captain

## Earl Is Chosen Harrier Manager

Alexander L. Bourgerie '42 and Howard H. Earl '42 have been elected captain and manager respectively of the 1942 varsity cross-country team.

Bourgerie was chosen at a team banquet held Tuesday night at the Nittany Lion Inn and Earl was chosen at elections by the cross-country executive committee which met yesterday afternoon. The team at its banquet also chose Guyer (Tink) Candy '44 honorary captain of this year's freshman squad.

Other cross-country managers named yesterday afternoon were: Associate managers, Richard M. Steinhilber '42 and William B. Rosskam II '42; first assistant managers, Frank E. Baldwin '43, Joseph R. Quickel '43 and C. Henry McCall '43; freshman manager, Charles E. Hannan, Jr. '43; and alternate managers, Lynn Kippax '43 and Robert R. Sieger '43.

In voting on the sophomore candidates for managerships, the cross-country executive committee made two changes in the recommendations submitted by the outgoing first assistant managers.

On hearing a protest made by two of the three managers last night, Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, said that the changes would stand. They were made in the best interests of the sport, he said, and were according to authority vested in the committee by the Athletic Association constitution. The decision of the five-man committee was unanimous, he reported.

The outgoing first-assistant managers had handed in identical lists in recommending their successors.

Members of the committee which took the action are: Mr. Fleming; Charles D. Werner, coach of cross-country; William J. Smith '41, cross-country captain; G. Edward Spencer '41, cross-country manager; and Jack W. Brand '41, president of the Athletic Association. Frank A. Gleason '41, secretary of the Athletic Association, attended the meeting as a non-voting member.

Managership elections for football and soccer will be held today.

## Matmen Schedule Five Home Meets

Featuring a formidable array of home meets, Penn State's wrestling Lions will initiate their 1941 campaign against Maryland on the Rec Hall mats January 11.

Following the Maryland battle, Charlie Speidel's grapplers will tangle with Lehigh, Cornell, Michigan and Army in successive home encounters.

Lehigh, Eastern Intercollegiate Champion for the last three years and always one of State's most dangerous opponents, comes here February 8 for one of the top meets of the season.

February 22 the Cornell grapplers will invade Rec Hall as part of a Saturday double attraction that will also feature a battle between Leo Houck's boxers and the Army Cadets.

The last meet on the wrestlers' home card will be with Army, climaxing one of the most impressive schedules that Rec Hall has had for a number of years.

Syracuse, Princeton and Navy round out the grapplers' card, with all three meets being scheduled for foreign mats.

## Rec Hall To Open For Sunday Use

Ambitious youths bursting with energy will be given an opportunity to rid themselves of surplus weight in Rec Hall Sunday afternoons from now until May 11, with the exceptions of Sundays falling within holiday periods.

Dr. Carl P. Schott, dean of Physical Education, agreed to free Rec Hall from its shackles, when approached with the proposition by the Recreation committee. With a well-rounded recreation program planned for each Sunday, the grand opening is set for this Sunday.

Admittance to Rec Hall will be granted to all students upon presentation of their matriculation cards. If, however, after a student is admitted to the building, he opens one of the side doors to admit a person not a student, the Sunday recreation program will be abandoned. Dr. Schott declared that the program is designed to accommodate students only.

Only through the cooperation of all students can the Sunday program continue, it was learned. A campus patrolman will be stationed at the southeast locker room door to check matriculation cards.

Activities will begin on the floor soon after 2 p. m. and continue until 5 p. m., after which the building will be locked at 5:30 p. m. Exit should be made by all students through the door at which the patrolman is stationed.

In charge of the various activities on the main floor will be three Physical Education majors who will see that all students have the same opportunities to use whatever facilities they desire. During certain seasons of the year, however, organized intramural activities will be given first preference in the use of floor space and equipment.

Upon presentation of the student's towel ticket, he will be loaned any equipment he wants from the equipment room; but he must return the equipment at closing time.

## Nittany Lion Soccermen Select '40 All-Opponent Collegiate Team

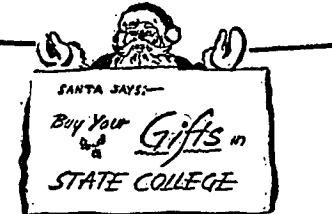
