Jumping into the whirlpool which will be Penn State's sports schedules these next few weeks, we find that:

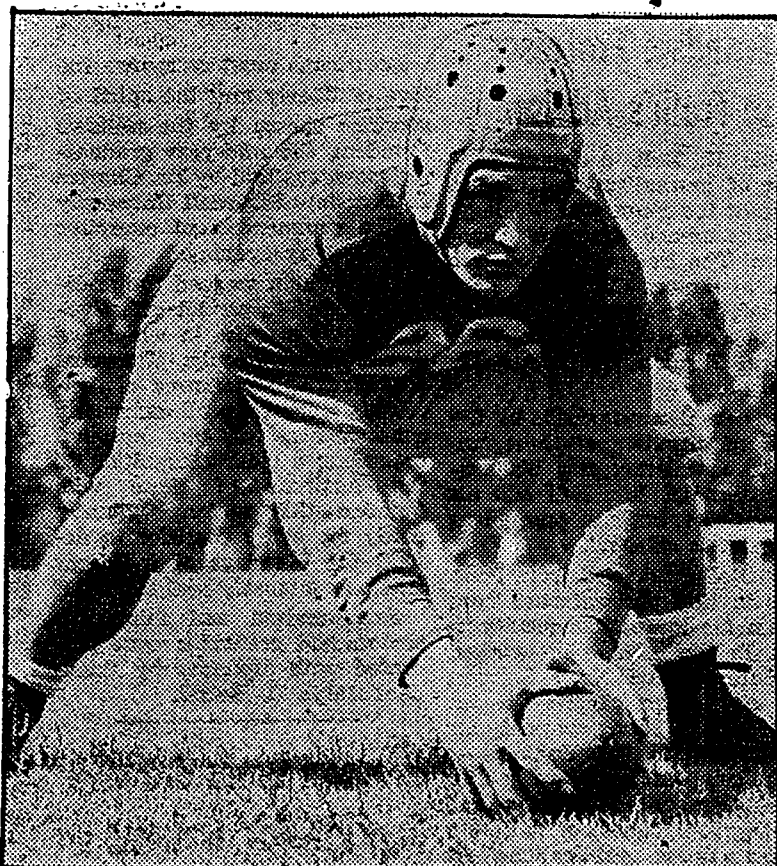

Gajecki's Picture Will Go Up In Penn State's Hall Of Fame As Sixth Football All-American

Now officially recognized by local administrators, Leon Gajecki, 1940 Lion grid captain, pictured above, will have his picture erected in Rec Hall as State's sixth All-American, joining past pigskin greats, Mother Dunn, Glenn Killinger, Bob Higgins, Charley Way and Joe Bedenk.

Following is the official statement released yesterday to the Collegian by Carl P. Schott, Dean of the School of Physical Education and Athletics:

"It gives me great pleasure to announce that Leon Gajecki's picture will be placed in Recreation Hall along with Penn State's five other All-American football players.

"In view of the interest show by the student body and also manifested by The Daily Collegian I thought it advisable to discuss this matter with the Executive Committee of the School of Physical Education. This Committee was unanimously in favor of honoring our 1940 captain in this manner.

"We believe it advisable not to establish any definite policy regarding the selection of future athletes for this honor, concluding that it would be best to judge each case as the occasion arises. The Committee hopes for many such "problems" in the future.

"I wish to express my gratitude for the many communications received from students, all in favor of recognizing Gajecki's ability as a football player by including his picture with the greats of the past. Such universal sentiment is only one more indication of the real worth of our captain."

Matmen Seek Third Straight Win In Away Match Against Princeton

After smashing Maryland and Syracuse in two lopsided matches, the Nittany Lion wrestlers will stack up against a powerful Princeton outfit tomorrow night as they invade the Tiger lair for their first dual contest after semester exams.

Toting a powerful punch in all eight of its bouts, the Nittany Lion is conceded a favorite to win its third consecutive battle. All the grapplers are in fighting shape, according to Coach Charlie Speidel.

Captain Frank Gleason will lead the Nittany matmen against the Tigers and will seek his tenth consecutive dual triumph. Glenn Alexander, junior reserve from last year, will replace Allan Crabtree in the 145-pound spot.

Other grapplers are Clair Hess, 121-pound; Charlie Ridenour, 128-pound; Joe Scalzo, 155-pound; Chuck Rohrer, 165-pound; Joe Valla, 175-pound; and Jack Kerns, heavyweight.

Ewell Competes At Seton Hall

After failing miserably to place in the 60-yard semi-finals, then flashing to a special 300-yard dash victory in the Millrose A.A. games Saturday night in Madison Square Garden in New York City, the Nittany Lion's speedster, Barney Ewell, will attempt to regain top sprint honors tonight in the Seton Hall indoor games.

While Harold Davis had easy pickings in his semi-final heat and final 60-yard dash, Ewell ran third to Tom Carey, Metropolitan titleholder, and NYU's Dave Lawyer to stymie any chances of a Ewell-Davis feud.

Davis did not compete in the 300-yard dash because of a stomach ailment which he suffered after his shorter sprint, which left the Lion sprinter little competition as he breasted the tape in 32 seconds.

The dusky Lion runner is expected to hook up in a sprinting duel with such top-notch performers as Fred Wolcott and Eulace Peacock in the 50, 60, and 70-yard short distances in the Seton Hall track competition. Despite his setback in the Millrose games, he is still conceded the favorite.
