Nibbling At The News

Reich Rendezvous

Only the future will tell just what part of the world Herr Hitler and Signor Mussolini planned to civilize next at their recent rendezvous, but a quick glance at the slightly-chipped horoscope would seem to indicate that the conference reached it's climactic point when Adolph and Benito shook hands.

During the past three years each meeting of these two ornated European eagle scouts has resulted in violent tremors on the continent similar to those of a Chilean earthquake, but with more lasting effects. However, this last coming-out party thrown by Blitzkrieg Incorporated assumed all the aspects of a typical English vote of confidence in the Houses of Parliament.

In a speech immediately following the meeting, Der Fuehrer explained, "The German mentality has always looked with diffidence on the principle of pacts, and has given preference to the principle of honor and fidelity. For the links constituted by a written pact it substitutes the living link of one man to another."

In other words, future pacts between Germany and Italy will be sealed by a hand-clasp. Anyway, its less embarrassing that way, and it is possible to wash one's hands, while ink has the ugly habit of remaining to record history for future generations to read.

This new alliance between Hitler and Mussolini could easily have had rather awkward psychological effects. The mental picture of these two men shaking hands might esaily have portrayed Adolph as a carnivorous canine looking woefully at the close tie-up he had with a very annoying tin-can which was tied to his tail.

Hitler also announced to the civilized world that he has always looked with diffidence or embarrassment on the principle of pacts, but this little item has already been recorded in history books, which all makes the Reichsfuehrer's speeches somewhat ancient. Finito.

Drummond Heads Meeting Of New Council

The first meeting of the newly-formed Pennsylvania Nutrition Council met in Harrisburg to plan its program for the coming year under the leadership of Miss Laura W. Drummond, director and professor of home economics, on Friday, February 24.

Dr. Pauline B. Mack, professor of textile chemistry, presented some findings of the Human Nutrition Research Project sponsored by the School of Agriculture and the Department of Health in Harrisburg. These members were appointed by President Ralph D. Hetzel with other members representing professions and lay organizations of Pennsylvania to promote and protect health and nutrition of Pennsylvania citizens as a part of national defense.
