Actual Rushing To End Tonight

When silent period begins at 9 p. m. tonight, actual concentrated rushing for this year will end, although Saturday's formal dinners will climax the 1940-1941 season.

Invitations to formal dinners will be sent tonight and dormitory women will receive them tomorrow morning. Town women, however, have been asked by Panhellenic Council to call for invitations at Student Union tomorrow morning. Acceptances or refusals must be at Student Union by 5 p. m. tomorrow when sorority rushing chairmen will collect them.

Each freshman may attend two dinners if she has not yet made up her mind, but must indicate which dinner she wishes to attend on her acceptance.

We, The Women—Some Rushing Don'ts For Perplexed Frosh

Don't forget to look over the other freshmen the house is rushing because you will be living with members of that group for the remainder of your College life.

Don't be swayed by "lead piping." If the sorority women don't give you credit for being able to make up your own mind, then cross them from your list. Judge the standards of the house by its rushing policies. If the members talk down other houses or weep and gush over you they are not worth consideration. If the house breaks the rushing code to contact you during silent periods you can reason that its other promises won't be kept.

Don't let the house, if there is one, and its appearance influence your choice.

Don't seek advice from campus men or women, since their remarks might be based on interests which differ from yours.

Don't consider such superficial claims as the founding date, number of chapters, and outward appearance of the members of prime importance.

Don't think that being a sorority woman is an insurance policy for dates—as always that depends on you.

Don't think that a sorority pin is something to be worn as a feather in your cap. Join only if you are sure you will fit into the group and its interests.

Don't fail to investigate the truth of promises about things to happen in the future, since more than likely they will always remain just promises.

Don't go to more than one formal dinner unless you are still undecided. It is just as unfair for you to keep a house dangling as it is for the house to be insincere with you.

Don't list more than one house on your preference sheet unless you would willingly join the house of your second choice.

Don't pledge if your choice is still uncertain on Sunday. There is plenty of time to make the final selection during open rushing season which starts two weeks after the present concentrated period. If the house really wants you it will be eager to pledge you during open season.
