In its busiest meeting of the year, the Board took these other important actions:

### Platforms, Petitions Deadline Noon Today

Selection of Robert D. Baird for All-College president and Gerald F. Doherty as his running mate on the Independent ticket climaxed the '42 and '43 Independent nominations last night as the curtain fell on clique primaries, setting the stage for the All-College political campaign.

Coincident with the announcement that all party petitions and platforms are due at noon today, Richard C. Peters '41, chairman of the elections committee, revealed that the political mass meeting would be held in Schwab Auditorium at 8:15 p.m., instead of 7 p. m., next Tuesday.

R. Glenn Alexander was named as the Independent senior class presidential nominee, with James L. Clovis as the vice-president candidate. Secretary and treasurer posts were given to Paul C. Mall and Janet M. Hartz, respectively.

In the final Independent nominations, the '43 clique chose William T. Richards for their presidential aspirant. George N. Rumsey will campaign for vice president, Glayds E. Fitting for secretary, and Thomas R. Ridge for treasurer.

All party platforms submitted today must contain the All-College averages of the candidates.

Active campaigning for party candidates will not be allowed until after the mass meeting, Peters warned. Any violators will be tried by the Student Tribunal, and if found guilty of election code violations will be subject to dismissal from College.
