

# New IM Scoring Eliminates Points For Managers, Letters, Numeral Men

A change in the intramural scoring system, unanimously adopted yesterday by the Intramural Board, eliminates all points for having varsity letter winners, managers or numeral men. The All Year Intramural Trophy, to be given each year to the winner as a permanent possession, will now be "strictly an intramural trophy," Charles L. Albright '41, chairman of the board, said last night.

The board also tallied the points for cross country, football, swimming, and boxing, and Alpha Chi Sigma was found to be leading the intramural race so far with 187 points, in the fraternity division, the Forestry Society was leading the independent teams with 151 points.

The new scoring system goes into effect immediately. The Intramural Board will publish the standings of the fraternities and independent teams at the end of each sports season.

Penn State enjoyed a gala sport day on Saturday when seven Lion teams emerged victorious while Barney Ewell narrowly missed annexing two National A.A.U. championships in New York. State's one-man track team placed second in the 60-yard dash and finished third in the broad jump.

Jimmy Sykes and John Glenn finished in a tie for fifth place in the high jump.
