### Clark Praises College As Agency For Making Better Men And Women

"We have a divinely ordained spot to make better men and women, and Penn State is the agency to do it," stated Russell B. Clark, College bursar, in his talk "Our College, What Do You Know of It?" second in a series of fireside sessions and coffee hours held in the southeast lounge of Atherton at 6:30 p. m. last night.

"No other school in Pennsylvania gets as good men and women as Penn State. We get the cream of the crop," Mr. Clark went on. "Outside of our families Penn State means more to us than anything else."

Mr. Clark praised the engineering, chemistry, mineral industries, agricultural, liberal arts, and graduate schools as standing at the top in national educational rating.
