## Grafinger To Receive Annual Senior Award

Phi Eta Sigma, freshman men's honorary society, has released the names of 50 students who have been accepted as initiates.

## AA Amendment Would Eliminate Pieo

Amendments limiting sport eligibility to eight semesters and establishing the numeral award as an Athletic Association award will be presented at the May AA elections, May 13, Jack W. Brand '41, president, announced yesterday.

Both amendments were approved by the Athletic Advisory Board in February. The eligibility rule would eliminate all athletes who have attended college more than eight semesters among them Roman Pieo, gym captain-elect. The numeral change transfers financial responsibility for the awards from the interclass funds to the AA funds. Requirements continue as listed in the Freshman Handbook.

(Continued from Page One) would be a faculty of four or five men and special short courses in addition to the four-year curricula.

Playing the soil erosion probe sponsored and conducted by Rep. Clayton E. Moul (D., York), Mr. McDowell said, "I find that I have been under a misapprehension. I thought the committee wanted to get all the facts. I find that it is not so much an investigating committee as a prosecuting committee to convict an alleged criminal."

The minority member of the committee, Rep. Frank Snyder (R., Tioga) said, "I am inclined to think the farmers of Pennsylvania approve of what the (Penn State) extension service does for them."

Mr. McDowell pointed out that full operation of the soil erosion program in Pennsylvania would cost the state \$70,304,000. (Its present appropriation for the work is \$1,000.) He argued that Pennsylvania's soil erosion problems are not as serious as in other states and should be met by educational work rather than "tremendous expenditures of government funds."

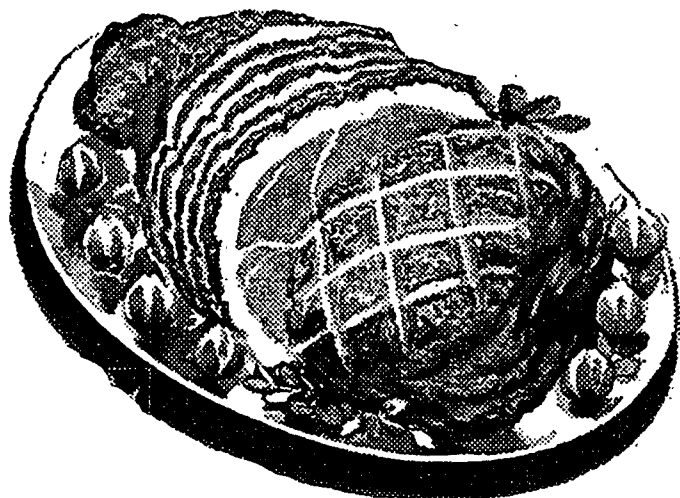
