

# Lion Diamondmen Gain 3-0 Victory Over Susquehanna In Rain

## Trackmen Leave For Penn Relays

Twenty of the 3000 track and field athletes to participate in the Penn Relays Carnival this weekend will be Werner-coached Lions from the Nittany Mountains. About half the squad will leave for Philadelphia today, and the rest will go tomorrow.

With Penn State's point winning chances very slim according to track mentor Chick Werner, the Lion's best hopes will be carried by the flying feet of Negro sprint star Barney Ewell as he pounds the cinders in the special invitation 100-yard dash.

Ewell, NCAA 100 and 220-yard champion, although favored in the century field will find a strong competitor in Welby Williams of North Texas Teachers' College, who was nosed out only once in the 100-yard dash last year.

Also a team to be definitely reckoned with Saturday will be the Lion's two-mile relay quartet made up of Pat Kjellman, Max Peters, Jim Williams and Norm Gordon.

By turning his ankle over the past week-end, Don Dolbin, promising sprinter from Pottsville, dampened the Nittanymen's chances in the sprint relay. If Dolbin does not run Werner plans to use the following Lions in the 440 and 880 yard relays: Barney Ewell, Barney Plesser, Al Price, and Captain Van Hartman.

Johnny Glenn, sophomore who jumped over 6 feet, 4 inches indoors this winter and who placed second in the IC4-A's will be Penn State's best bet in the high jump, and in the pole vault event Joe Bakura, and Scotty Moffat will represent the Lions.

Well known for last year's record-breaking javelin thrower Nick Vukmanic, Penn State will attempt to fill his shoes this weekend with a promising sophomore Quent Dietrick. Dietrick is expected to approach 200 feet with the spear.

In the two-mile run State will enter Norm Gordon, Herm Goffberg and Alex Bourgerie. Other entries are shot putters Saul Hanin and Frank Platt, and discus spinner Len Frescoln.

## Medlar Pitches 3-Hitter; Game Stopped In 7th

A continuous drizzling rain failed to dull the claws of the Nittany Lions yesterday afternoon as they chalked up their second straight win, a seven-inning 3-0 victory over the Susquehanna Crusaders.

Righthander Chuck Medlar yielded three scattered hits to the visitors and allowed only one Crusader to pass second base. Medlar was handed the pitching assignment in a last minute switch by Coach Joe Bedenk when Jim Richardson, previously slated for mound duty, developed a sore arm.

Scoring was confined to the fourth inning, in which the Lions grouped three singles and a base on balls for all three of their runs.

Lead-off man Freddy Ball walked and was advanced to second when the Susquehanna second baseman fumbled a hard hit grounder by Warren Kolkebeck. John Ebersole loaded the bases with a grounder which the Crusader pitcher threw to third too late to catch Ball. Clean-up batter Bill Debler smashed a clean single into left field, scoring Ball and Kolkebeck, and sending Ebersole to second. Peany Gates advanced both runners with a sacrifice bunt down the first base line, and catcher Alex Basista brought Ebersole across the plate with a single down the third base line. Captain Eddie Sapp flied out to the third baseman to end the inning.

The Nittany diamondmen threatened again in the sixth inning when Ebersole was passed and advanced to second on Peany Gates' single. The rally was stopped when Basista and Sapp grounded out.

Medlar retired the Crusaders in order, in four of their seven innings at bat, registering two strike-outs and giving no bases on balls. He was in trouble only once, when the first two men up in the fifth blasted singles into the outfield. Two ground outs and a fly-out killed the threat.

The game was called after six and a half innings when the constant rain became heavier and made continuation of the game impossible.

Susquehanna's defeat was their first this season. They had previously edged Bucknell 4-3 and downed Hartwick by a 5-2 count.
