Scholars To Be Honored At Mother's Day Chapel

Hetzel To Present 16 Highest Awards

Outstanding scholastic achievements of the past year will be given recognition before an expected audience of 5,000 at the annual Scholarship-Mother's Day chapel service in Rec Hall at 10:30 a.m. tomorrow.

President Ralph D. Hetzel will present the 16 highest College awards and pay tribute to all the other students who have done meritorious work.

Dr. Albert W. Beaven, president of Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, will speak on "The Home, Religion, and Days Ahead." Music will be provided by the Blue Band and College Choir, who will combine in a special chorale, "Adoramus Te."

Morton E. Jenkins will receive the John W. White Medal and Prize for outstanding scholarship in the senior class. John W. White fellowships for graduate study will be presented to Ray H. Dutt, Nelia M. Hazard, and Oliver A. Schaeffer.

Evan Pugh Scholars who will receive gold (senior) medals are Thomas Czubiak, Louis N. Grafinger, William P. Hindman, Jr., Norman Racusin, and P. Jeanne Richards. Silver (junior) medals will go to William E. Harkins, Edward A. Kachik, John S. Kookogey, Paul Lazar, and Milton E. Prensky.

The President Sparks Medal, awarded to the student showing the greatest improvement over a preceding semester, will be presented to Helen Elizabeth Sharpe (second semester, 1939-40) and James Deforest Patterson (first semester, 1940-41).

Defense Courses Near Full Quotas

Twenty-two students, including those not planning to return to College next year and 1941 graduates, have applied for the production engineering course in the summer College defense training program,

With a quota of 32 students for the course, Dean Harry P. Hammond of the Engineering School yesterday urged interested students to apply promptly. Other colleges have not sent in their applicants yet.

Enrollment for the materials, testing, and inspection course by College students and graduates has been rapid, but the quota has not been filled, Hammond revealed. The application deadline is set for June 11.
