Stickmen Beat Quakers, 15-4, In Last Home Game

Having drubbed Penn, 15-4, Saturday on New Beaver Field for its second victory of the season, Penn State's revitalized lacrosse team hits the road this weekend on a two-meet trip on which they face Cornell, Friday, and Hobart on Saturday.

The Quaker contest was a field day for the rampaging Lion stickmen, who piled up five scores in the first period and six more in the second quarter to hold a half-time advantage of 11-1. With reserves playing most of the second half the Nittany-men slowed down, and coasted in, tallying only three goals in the third stanza and two in the final quarter.

Lions, Princeton, Hoyas To Meet

By losing their first match of the season to Princeton 5-4 Saturday morning, the Lion golfers today found themselves tied for first place in the Southern Division of the Eastern Intercollegiate Golf Association.

Tied with the Lions are Princeton and Georgetown, defending champion. The three teams will battle it out next Friday at Stamford, Conn., for the right to meet Yale, the Northern division leader, on Saturday for the EIGA title.

The Lion-Tiger match was decided in the second foursome by Bob Boynton's 20-foot putt on the 18th hole. Nittanymen Captain Jack Brand and Don Hart had won the third foursome for State, and Princeton had taken the first foursome to tie the score 3 all. The second foursome, however, was split between Princeton's Arnold Zimmerman and State's Chuck Seebold until Boynton's shot gave the Tigers the edge with the best ball point.

State retaliated in the afternoon match to score an easy 6-3 triumph over Penn. The Lions made a clean sweep of the second foursome, took best ball and one match in the first, and won one match in the third.

In other matches played Saturday, Georgetown, after bowing to State Friday, rallied the next day to get a double killing over Pitt and Cornell. Penn trounced Cornell, 8-1, in the morning and Princeton defeated Pittsburgh, 7-2, in the afternoon.

Dick Harris, captain of the Georgetown team, took medal honors for the week-end by shooting a 67 over the College course on Saturday afternoon. Captain Jack Brand, of Penn State, was second high in medal play with a 68.

Gymnasts Place Fourth In National Contest

With Roman Pico defending his national rope climbing title, the Penn State gymnasts placed fourth in the National Intercollegiate Gymnastic Meet.

In defending his title Pico defeated Richardson of Army, Eastern Intercollegiate champion who had beaten Pico twice this year. Penn State's Art Hand and Charles Senft placed fifth and sixth respectively in the rope climb.

In other contests, Harold Zimmerman came within two points of the tumbling title, while Sol Small placed on the rings. Lou Bordo and Eddie Anderson placed high on parallel bars and in tumbling.

NYU Football Game To Be Played At Night

Penn State will play the first night game in its football history with New York University on the New York Polo Grounds Friday, October 31, the Athletic Advisory Board decided Saturday morning.

Originally scheduled for Saturday, November 1, the NYU game was advanced to Friday night because three other major games are scheduled in New York on Saturday: Army-Notre Dame, Cornell-Columbia, and Purdue-Fordham.

Army Team Tops Lion Trackmen

Despite Joe Bakura's new Penn State pole vault record of 13 feet 5 inches and Barney Ewell's double win in the two sprint events, the Nittany Lion trackmen were edged 66¼ to 59¼ in their second dual meet of the season by the Cadets at West Point Saturday.

Bakura's record broke the one he had established last spring against Navy of 13 feet 3¾ inches. In winning the century spring Ewell had his best time of the season, 9.6.

Saul Hanin again took top honors in the shot put by outdistancing the Soldiers with a heave of 44 feet 5¾ inches. Penn State took six of the 14 events and the outcome of the match was not determined until the final discus event was over.

Disappointing aspects of the meet were Ewell's failure to place in the broadjump and Johnny Glenn's poor showing in the high jump. However, Max Peters showed up well as he ran his fastest half mile in 1:56 to take second in this event.

Sophomore sprinter Don Dolbin also pleased Coach Chick Werner as he finished two yards behind Ewell to take seconds in both the 220 and 100 yard dashes.

Norm Gordon was first in the mile run timed at 4:33.6, and Frank Platt heaved the discus 123 feet 3½ inches for five additional Lion points.

Cornell Netmen Hand Lions Fourth Defeat

Cornell's Big Red racquetmen handed the Lion tennis squad their fourth defeat of the season by a 7-2 score Saturday. The local courtmen will leave for Navy today where they will attempt to regain their .500 average tomorrow, which was upset so handily by the Cornellmen.

Lion Nine Leaves For Pittsburgh; Loses 2nd To Syracuse, 12-8

After taking a one day rest following an unsuccessful three game road trip, Penn State's diamondmen leave town at 5:45 p. m. today for Pittsburgh, where they play the Panther nine in Pitt Stadium tomorrow afternoon.

Coach Joe Bedenk's tossers dropped a 12-8 decision to Syracuse on Saturday, making it two losses to the Orangemen this season.

Fran Farris, Nittany rightfielder, cracked a leg bone above his ankle while sliding into second base in the sixth inning. Farris was treated in Syracuse for the injury but returned with the team on Sunday and is now under observation in the College infirmary.

Veteran Chuck Medlar, Lion righthander, yielded 12 hits to the Orangemen. The Boys from Syracuse reached their scoring height in the eighth inning, in which they pushed across five of their total twelve runs.

Roy Moran, Syracuse twirler who chalked up a 10 inning 7-4 win over the Nittany baseballers earlier in the season, again got

credit for taming the Lions. Moran allowed only four hits and would have limited the Bedenkmen to less than eight runs had it not been for faulty fielding by his teammates, who made six errors.
