More than \$400 worth of cigarette tobacco is thrown away in Old Main by Penn Staters in one school year, a statistical compilation has

revealed. A great majority of the 400 butts collected in a single day's sweeping of Old Main are at least half unsmoked, janitors have estimated. Here and there, it is true, may be found a "butt definitely" less than three-fourths of an inch in length, but most of them measure fully one. and three-eighths inches.

Granting, then, that 40 halfsmoked cigarettes are the equivalent of one pack, 10 packs of potential coughs are wasted in Old Main in a day, 70 in a week, and 2.520 in two semesters. Wasting eight cents on each pack, extravagant smokers throw away \$403.20 worth of valuable nicotine in a
